## Welsh Assembly Government's response to the recommendations of the Audit Committee report Late payments to farmers in Wales

Thank you for your letter of 12 May 2004 regarding the response from the Welsh Assembly Government to the Audit Committee's report *Late payments to farmers in Wales*. You sought the Auditor General's advice on the contents of the response and on any follow-up action that the Committee might take.

The Welsh Assembly Government has generally responded positively to the Committee's report, accepting fully five of the six recommendations that the Committee made. In particular, the Assembly Government has undertaken to publicise its targets for making CAP payments and report performance achieved (recommendation 1), and has appointed a qualified communications officer (recommendation 5) which should help to alleviate the problems the Assembly encountered in dealing with stakeholders in the farming community during the period under review. On recommendation 6, that the Assembly should normally set fixed budgets for projects, the Government refers to its new overarching IT contract, Merlin, under which each project will be individually assessed with a view to deciding on the most appropriate type of contract in each case. The Committee will recall that the Auditor General intends to start an examination of the Merlin contract later this year and shall be able to consider whether the arrangements in place are likely to deliver value for money.

**Recommendation 4** was partially accepted. This recommendation concerned the level at which the Government pays compensation to its clients in cases such as this. The response explains that the current rate has been agreed by all UK agriculture departments, but that, in view of the Committee's concern, the Assembly Government will review the current levels of compensation with its counterparts later this year. This appears to be a reasonable approach in the circumstances; and the Committee might wish to receive an update from the Government on the outcome of these deliberations in due course.
