Health and Social Services Committee Scrutiny Sub-Committee

Report to the Health and Social Services Committee on the First Meeting

The topics for the first meeting, selected by the sub-committee members, on which the Minister was scrutinised were:

- The National Health Service Capital Investment Programme;
- The Ambulance Service in Wales;
- Services for Children who are looked-after by the local authority during their transition to adulthood.

The main issues raised in questioning were:

Capital Investment Programme

- Concern that the bureaucratic nature of preparing business cases slowed down the process and that LHBs were required to sign up to the revenue consequences of any investment.
- Assembly Government constraints on the ways external funds could be utilised, particularly the European Investment Fund.
- The timing of public consultation on any reconfiguration of services and the weight that would be

placed on public opinion.

- The involvement of trusts in the reconfiguration process.
- The impact of capital investment on staffing and the need for extended training and reconfiguration of people's skills.
- The need to ring-fence money in advance for specific projects.
- The adequacy of funding allocated for diagnostics.
- The need to develop local capacity.
- The apparent disparity in mental health funding between North and South Wales.

Ambulance Service

- The impact that out of hours provision had on the demand for ambulance services.
- The need to look at different ways of working, such as ambulance crews carrying out triage, and reducing delays in handover times at A&E departments.
- Whether a lack of A&E consultants was contributing to delays in turnaround time.
- Funding for the air ambulance service.

Looked After Children

- Disappointment that the educational attainment level for looked after children was so much lower than the rest of the population.
- The role of independent reviewing officers and their power to refer cases to CAFCASS.
- The inappropriate use of bed and breakfast accommodation.
- Provision of mental health services for looked after children during the transition to adulthood.
- Services for disabled young people.
- The need for stability of placements.
- The need for local authorities to have a transitional plan for each looked after child based on their individual needs and with its own funding source.
- The duty on local authority members to be corporate parents.
- The need for the Welsh Assembly Government to monitor expenditure on Children's First initiatives once it is absorbed into the revenue support grant.
