Cwestiynau i'r Prif Weinidog Questions to the First Minister

Y Sefyllfa yn Irac The Situation in Iraq

Q1 John Griffiths: Will the First Minister make a statement on the current position regarding the impact of the situation in Iraq on the Assembly's delivery of its policies? (OAQ23799)

The First Minister (Rhodri Morgan): There is no evidence at present to suggest that the situation in Iraq has had any perceptible impact on the objectives set out in the Assembly's operational plan. Similarly, there has been no discernible impact on the public services in Wales that underpin these objectives. There are, of course, reservists from the national health service giving outstanding service with the troops in the Gulf. The earliest possible impact that we might see in Wales would be rotaplanes arriving at Cardiff international airport carrying injured service personnel to Welsh hospitals; that has not yet occurred.

John Griffiths: The Assembly rightly stresses the importance of equality of opportunity and social inclusion. Addressing the challenges faced by ethnic minorities is an important part of that agenda. Unfortunately, the war in Iraq, and the situation with regard to asylum seekers, allows the prejudiced, the unprincipled and the opportunistic to attempt to exploit current circumstances for perceived political gain. Will you join me in condemning the decision by the British National Party to field candidates in the Assembly elections, and in deplored the inclusion in the Welsh Conservative Party's manifesto of a policy of secure accommodation for asylum seekers, even though it is not—

The Presiding Officer: Order. I was not aware that the First Minister had any link with, or responsibility for, the policies of the BNP, or of the Welsh Conservative group.

C1 John Griffiths: A wnaiff y Prif Weinidog ddatganiad am y sefyllfa bresennol mewn perthynas â'r effaith a gaiff yr hyn sy'n digwydd yn Irac o safbwyt cyflawni polisiau'r Cynulliad? (OAQ23799)

Y Prif Weinidog (Rhodri Morgan): Nid oes unrhyw dystiolaeth ar hyn o bryd sy'n awgrymu i'r sefyllfa yn Irac gael unrhyw effaith ganfyddadwy ar yr amcanion a nodir yng nghynllun gweithredu'r Cynulliad. Yn yr un modd, ni fu effaith ddirnadwy ar y gwasanaethau cyhoeddus yng Nghymru sy'n ategu'r amcanion hyn. Wrth gwrs, mae milwyr wrth gefn o'r gwasanaeth iechyd gwladol sy'n rhoi gwasanaeth rhagorol gyda'r milwyr yn y Gwllff. Yr effaith gyntaf bosibl y gallem ei gweld yng Nghymru fyddai awyrennau ar rota yn cyrraedd maes awyr rhwng gwladol Caerdydd gan gludo milwyr a anafwyd i ysbytai yng Nghymru; ni ddigwyddodd hynny eto.

John Griffiths: Mae'r Cynulliad yn rhoi pwyslais priodol ar bwysigrwydd cyfle cyfartal a chynhwysiant cymdeithasol. Rhan bwysig o'r agenda honno yw ymdrin â'r heriau y mae lleiafrifoedd ethnig yn eu hwynebu. Gwaetha'r modd, mae'r rhyfel yn Irac, a'r sefyllfa o ran ceiswyr lloches, yn rhoi cyfle i rai rhagfarnllyd, diegwyddor a manteisgar geisio elwa ar yr amgylchiadau sydd ohoni er mwyn ennill yr hyn a ystyriant yn fantais wleidyddol. A wnewch ymuno â mi i gollfarnu penderfyniad y Blaid Genedlaethol Brydeinig i roi ymgeiswyr i sefyll yn etholiadau'r Cynulliad, ac i resynu at yffaith bod polisi o lety cadw ar gyfer ceiswyr lloches wedi'i gynnwys ym maniffesto Plaid Geidwadol Cymru, er nad yw—

Y Llywydd: Trefn. Ni wyddwn fod unrhyw gysylltiad rhwng y Prif Weinidog a pholisiau'r BNP, na grŵp Ceidwadwyr Cymru, na bod ganddo unrhyw gyfrifoldeb

drostynt.

The First Minister: A meeting of the Inter-faith Council for Wales was held last Thursday, at which the four party leaders were present. There was agreement on the sentiments expressed with regard to ensuring that there is no spill-over into Wales as a result of the situation in the middle east. All party manifestos should be compatible with the declaration signed on 23 February, under the sponsorship of the Welsh Language Board, that we would not allow race or language to become an issue in the election—all parties should bear that in mind.

Cynog Dafis: Mae aelodau o'r gymuned Islamiaidd yng Nghymru yn bryderus y byddant, o bosibl, yn dioddef o ganlyniad i densiwn a gwrthdaro yn sgîl y gweithredu milwrol yn erbyn Irac. Maent hefyd yn teimlo'n hynod ddig, ar y cyfan, ynghylch y gweithredu milwrol hwnnw, sy'n ymosodiad ar wlad Islamiaidd. Mae hynny'n cyd-fynd â barn Islamiaidd ar draws y byd. Byddai'r gymuned Islamiaidd yn gwerthfawrogi arweiniad gennych chi, fel Prif Weinidog. A wnewch chi ddatgan eich safbwyt ar y gweithredu milwrol yn Irac?

Y Prif Weinidog: Dyna'r rheswm pam y sefydlwyd Cyngor Rhyng-grefyddol Cymru, a dyna pam y bu'n llwyddiant. Mae'n sicrhau nad yw'r tensiynau'n gwaethyg, yn yr un modd ag a welwyd yn y tri neu bedwar mis yn dilyn 11 Medi 2001. Mae'r cyfle i drafod y materion hyn rhwng y pleidiau a gynrychiolir yn y Cynulliad a chymunedau gwahanol grefyddau Cymru—fel y gwnaethpwyd ddydd Iau diwethaf—yn fanteisiol i bawb, gan ei fod yn dileu'r tensiwn. Dywedodd y rhan fwyaf o'r rhai a oedd yn bresennol yn y cyfarfod nad oes tystiolaeth, hyd yma, o gynnnydd yn y math o ddigwyddiadau a welwyd yn y misoedd yn dilyn 11 Medi 2001.

Glyn Davies: We hold a variety of opinions with regard to the decision to go to war, and many still express their opposition to that decision. My concern with regard to the public expression of opposition to the policy adopted by the Prime Minister is its effect on the morale of our armed forces in Iraq and

Y Prif Weinidog: Cynhaliwyd cyfarfod o Gyngor Rhyng-grefyddol Cymru ddydd Iau diwethaf, lle'r oedd y pedwar arweinydd plaid yn bresennol. Yr oedd cytundeb ar y farn a fynegwyd o ran sicrhau na fydd sgîl-effaith ar Gymru o ganlyniad i'r sefyllfa yn y dwyrain canol. Dylai maniffestos yr holl bleidiau fod yn gyson â'r datganiad a arwyddwyd ar 23 Chwefror, dan nawdd Bwrdd yr Iaith Gymraeg, i'r perwyl na fyddem yn caniatâu i hil neu iaith fod yn bwnc yn yr etholiad—dylai'r holl bleidiau gofio hynny.

Cynog Dafis: Members of the Islamic community in Wales are concerned that they may suffer as a result of tension and conflict arising from military action against Iraq. Generally speaking, they also feel extremely angry about this military action, which is an invasion of an Islamic country. That is in line with Islamic opinion across the world. The Islamic community would appreciate guidance from you, as First Minister. Will you say where you stand on the military action in Iraq?

The First Minister: That is why the Inter-faith Council for Wales was set up, and why it has been a success. It ensures that tensions do not increase, as was the case during the three or four months following 11 September 2001. The opportunity for the parties represented in the Assembly and different faith communities in Wales to discuss these matters—as we did last Thursday—benefits everyone, as it alleviates the tension. Most people present at the meeting said that there is no evidence, to date, of an increase in the kind of incidents seen in the months following 11 September 2001.

The First Minister: I am sure that I speak on behalf of all the people of Wales in saying that Welsh troops in the Gulf, and any that may yet be sent there, have our full support. Their conduct so far, the training that they have received and the temperament that they have demonstrated mean that they are ideally suited to the tasks that they have been given. They have carried out those tasks superbly. I am sure that they will continue to do so and that they have the support of everyone in Wales.

Y Prif Weinidog: Yr wyf yn siŵr fy mod yn siarad ar ran holl bobl Cymru wrth ddweud ein bod yn rhoi pob cefnogaeth i filwyr o Gymru sydd yn y Gwlff, ac unrhyw rai a anfonir yno yn y dyfodol. Mae eu hymddygiad hyd yma, yr hyfforddiant a gawsant a'r cymeriad a amlygasant yn golygu eu bod yn ddelfrydol ar gyfer y tasgau a roddwyd iddynt. Maent wedi cyflawni'r tasgau hynny'n rhagorol. Yr wyf yn sicr y byddant yn parhau i wneud hynny ac y bydd pawb yng Nghymru'n eu cefnogi.

Adolygu Targedau Dogfennau Strategol **Revision of Targets in Strategic Documents**

C2 Rhodri Glyn Thomas: A wnaiff y Prif Weinidog ddatganiad am unrhyw gynlluniau i adolygu targedau mewn unrhyw ddogfennau strategol a gyhoeddwyd gan Lywodraeth Cynulliad Cymru? (OAQ23790)

Q2 Rhodri Glyn Thomas: Will the First Minister make a statement on any plans to revise targets in any strategic documents published by the Welsh Assembly Government? (OAQ23790)

Y Prif Weinidog: Mae ein cynlluniau yn cynnwys targedau ymestynnol sydd wedi eu gweithredu drwy amryw o strategaethau ar lawer o faterion. Er enghraifft, cyhoeddwyd bod cyfanswm o dros 2,000 o swyddi ychwanegol wedi eu creu yn ystod y pum mis diwethaf. Mae hynny'n cynnwys 250 o swyddi yn y gwasanaeth sifil a gyhoeddwyd ddoe, i'w lleoli yn hanner y ganolfan alw yn Noc Penfro. Yr wyf yn siŵr y bydd pob Aelod yn croesawu'rffaith bod hynny wedi'i gyhoeddi ar ôl misoedd o drafodaethau, a bod cyfanswm o 2,000 o swyddi newydd wedi'u creu a 4,000 o swyddi wedi'u diogelu.

The First Minister: Our plans include challenging targets that have been carried forward through various strategies on many issues. For example, it has been announced that the total number of new jobs created during the last five months has crossed the 2,000 mark. That includes the 250 civil service jobs announced yesterday, to be located in half of the call centre in Pembroke Dock. I am sure that all Members will welcome the fact that that has been announced after months of discussions, and that a total of 2,000 new jobs have been created and 4,000 jobs have been safeguarded.

Rhodri Glyn Thomas: Yr wyf yn ddiolchgar i'r Prif Weinidog am gyfeirio at swyddi ac at ganolfannau galw. Pan ofynnais gwestiwn iddo ar 25 Chwefror, cyfeiriodd at Elev8 Solutions Cyf fel enghraifft o llwyddiant ei bolisiau ef a'i Lywodraeth yn Nyffryn Aman. A fyddai'n dymuno ailystyried y datganiad hwnnw y prynhawn yma?

Rhodri Glyn Thomas: I am grateful to the First Minister for referring to jobs and call centres. When I asked him a question on 25 February, he referred to Elev8 Solutions Ltd as an example of the success of his and his Government's policies in the Amman Valley. Would he like to reconsider that statement this afternoon?

Y Prif Weinidog: Mae swyddi mewn rhai sectorau yn gallu cael eu creu yn gyflym ond hefyd yn gallu cael eu colli'n gyflym. Mae hynny'n wir am swyddi mewn canolfannau

The First Minister: Jobs in some sectors can be lost as quickly as they are created. That is true of jobs in call centres. We saw that in the case of First Mobile UK Ltd three years ago;

Yr hyn sydd yn bwysig am y 2,000 o swyddi newydd—ac yr wylf yn siomedig nad oeddech yn fodlon croesawu'r cyhoeddiad a wnaethpwyd gan Andrew Smith, yr Ysgrifennydd Gwladol dros Waith a Phensyniau, ddoe, sydd o bwys i orllewin Cymru—yw'r amrwyiaeth o swyddi. Mae swyddi newydd yn cael eu creu yn y sector diwydiannol, mewn meddalwedd, mewn canolfannau galw, ac yn y sector cyhoeddus ledled Cymru. Mae'n drueni nad oeddech am ymateb i'r ffaitb bod 250 o swyddi ychwanegol yn Noc Penfro wedi cael eu creu yn sgil cyhoeddiad Andrew Smith ddoe.

David Ian Jones: In ‘Better Health, Better Wales’, the Assembly Government committed itself to establishing a network of expert patients by 2003. You will be aware that encouraging the self-management of conditions is an innovative approach to the challenges posed by long-term illness, and that the commitment was welcomed not only by patients’ groups but by the medical profession, and received cross-party support in the Assembly. Despite that, the network has not yet been fully implemented. In the dying days of this Assembly, can you give a commitment to the implementation of this much-needed network in Wales as soon as possible?

The First Minister: I think that you mean the dying days of this term of this Assembly, David, unless you have a hidden agenda. The principle behind the network is right. Many people now have illnesses that previously would have ended their lives quickly. However, now, if those illnesses are managed properly, using the patients’ skills, family support, consultant support—sometimes consultant support in the community—support from general practitioners and community nurses, patients can live 20 years or more. That is true of conditions such as diabetes and, often, cancer. Patients can play a major part in their own care, and that is an important development. I will write to you on the particular point that you raised about the

2,000 jobs were created and lost there. We also saw that in the case of ITV Digital in Pembroke Dock. Those kinds of jobs can be created quickly and can also disappear quickly. What is important about the 2,000 new jobs—and I am disappointed that you were not willing to welcome the announcement made yesterday by Andrew Smith, Secretary of State for Work and Pensions, which is important to west Wales—is the variety of jobs. New jobs are being created in the industrial sector, in software, in call centres, and in the public sector throughout Wales. It is a shame that you choose not to comment on the creation of an additional 250 jobs in Pembroke Dock following Andrew Smith’s announcement yesterday.

David Ian Jones: Yn ‘Gwell Iechyd, Gwell Cymru’, ymrwymodd Llywodraeth y Cynulliad i sefydlu rhwydwaith o gleifion arbenigol erbyn 2003. Gwyddoch fod annog hunanreolaeth ar anhwylderau'n ddull arloesol o wynebu'r heriau a geir oherwydd salwch hirdymor, a bod yr ymrwymiad hwnnw wedi'i groesawu gan grwpiau cleifion a hefyd gan y meddygon, a bod cefnogaeth drawsbleidiol iddo yn y Cynulliad hwn. Er hynny, nid yw'r rhwydwaith wedi'i roi ar waith yn llawn eto. Yn nyddiau olaf y Cynulliad hwn, a allwch ymrwymo i roi ar waith y rhwydwaith hwn y mae mawr angen amdano yng Nghymru cyn gynted ag y bo modd?

Y Prif Weinidog: Credaf mai dyddiau olaf y tymor hwn o'r Cynulliad hwn a olygwch, David, oni bai fod gennych agenda gudd. Mae'r egwyddor sy'n sail i'r rhwydwaith yn iawn. Mae llawer yn profi anhwylderau a fyddai, yn y gorffennol, wedi rhoi terfyn buan ar eu bywyd. Fodd bynnag, erbyn hyn, os rheolir yr anhwylderau hynny'n iawn, drwy ddefnyddio sgliau'r cleifion, cymorth y teulu, cymorth gan ymgynghorydd—a hynny yn y gymuned weithiau—cymorth gan ymarferwyr cyffredinol a nyrssys cymunedol, gall cleifion fyw am 20 mlynedd neu fwy. Mae hynny'n wir am anhwylderau fel clefyd siwgwr ac, yn aml, canser. Gall cleifion chwarae rhan o bwys yn eu gofal eu hunain, ac mae hynny'n ddatblygiad pwysig. Ysgrifennaf atoch

Tom Middlehurst: Will you join me in congratulating the people of north-east Wales on their industry and energy, which has resulted in the lowest unemployment levels there in a generation? That industry and energy is building business confidence in north-east Wales and making a significant contribution to the Assembly's strategic targets.

Tom Middlehurst: A wnewch ymuno â mi i longyfarch pobl y Gogledd-ddwyrain ar eu diwydrwydd a'u hegni, sydd wedi arwain at y lefelau isaf o ddiweithdra yno mewn cenhedlaeth? Mae'r diwydrwydd a'r egni hwnnw'n meithrin hyder mewn busnes yn y Gogledd-ddwyrain ac yn cyfrannu'n sylweddol at gyflawni targedau strategol y Cynulliad.

The First Minister: Flintshire is one of the industrial powerhouses of Great Britain, not just Wales. The Deeside industrial park is probably the most successful business park in Britain and the Airbus plant at Broughton is the largest manufacturing plant in Britain. It has the largest manufacturing plant investment, at over £500 million, of anywhere in Britain, and the largest number of apprentices in training on any site. The combination of those two, and many other industrial centres in Flintshire, mean that its continued ability to function as a powerhouse is of great importance to the future of the Welsh and British economy.

Y Prif Weinidog: Sir y Fflint yw un o bwerdai diwydiannol Prydain Fawr, yn ogystal â Chymru. Mae'n debyg mai parc diwydiannol Glannau Dyfrdwy yw un o'r parciau busnes mwyaf llwyddiannus ym Mhrydain a safle Airbus ym Mrychdyn yw'r safle gweithgynhyrchu mwyaf ym Mhrydain. Yno y buddsoddwyd y swm mwyaf mewn unrhyw safle gweithgynhyrchu ym Mhrydain, sef mwy na £500 miliwn, ac yno y mae'r nifer fwyaf o brentisiaid dan hyfforddiant ar unrhyw safle. Mae'r cyfuniad o'r ddwy ganolfan ddiwydiannol hynny, ynghyd â llawer o rai eraill yn Sir y Fflint, yn golygu ei bod yn bwysig iawn iddi allu parhau i ysgogi economi Cymru a Phrydain yn y dyfodol.

Arweinydd yr Wrthblaid (Ieuan Wyn Jones): Prif Weinidog, gadewch inni, ar ddiwedd y Cynulliad hwn, edrych ar eich record ar gyflawni targedau yn ystod y pedair blynedd diwethaf. Yr ydych wedi dweud yn gyhoeddus eich bod am gael eich barnu ar eich record, felly gadewch inni edrych ar y record honno. Edrychwn ar eich targed am y gwasanaeth iechyd o safbwyt rhestrau aros: mae'r rheini wedi codi i'r entrychion tra y buoch wrthi'n ailstrwythuro'r gwasanaeth iechyd, gan wario £15 miliwn ar greu mwy o reolwyr, yn hytrach na mwy o nyrsus a meddygon. O ran yr economi, mae cyflogau yng Nghymru yn is nag ydynt yng ngweddlill Prydain. Mae lefel cynnrych mewnwladol crynswth y pen yn is o dan Lafur nag y bu cyn 1999. Yr ydych hefyd yn wynebu beirniadaeth lem am y ffordd y mae arian Amcan 1 wedi cael ei wario. A ydych mewn gwirionedd, Brif Weinidog, yn teimlo mai dyma'r math o record yr ydych am ei hamddiffyn?

The Leader of the Opposition (Ieuan Wyn Jones): First Minister, at the end of this Assembly, let us look at your record in achieving targets during the past four years. You have said publicly that you wish to be judged on your record, therefore let us look at that record. Consider your target for waiting lists in the health service: waiting lists have rocketed while you have been restructuring the health service, spending £15 million on creating more managers, rather than more nurses and doctors. On the economy, wages in Wales are lower than in the rest of Britain. Gross domestic product per capita is lower under Labour than it was before 1999. You are also facing fierce criticism on how Objective 1 money has been spent. First Minister, do you really feel that this is the kind of record that you wish to defend?

Y Prif Weinidog: Mae bob amser yn beryglus i gredu propaganda Plaid Cymru. Dylai arweinydd Plaid Cymru dalu llawer o sylw i hynny. Mae'r ffigurau yn dangos, er enghrafft, fod diweithdra erbyn hyn yn is yng Nghymru nag ydyw yn y Deyrnas Unedig. Anaml iawn y bydd hynny'n digwydd—ni ddigwyddodd ond teirgwaith yn y 75 mlynedd diwethaf. Yn ôl mesur yr International Labour Organisation, mae ein diweithdra ni yn 4.8 y cant ac y mae'n 5 y cant dros Brydain gyfan. Gallwn i gyd ymfalchiö yn hynny, os ydym yn aelodau o'r Llywodraeth neu o'r gwrthbleidiau. Mae pawb yn gallu ymfalchiö bod diweithdra yn is yng Nghymru nag ydyw ym Mhrydain Fawr. O ran y gwasanaeth iechyd gwladol, yr ydym yn parhau i fuddsoddi mwy nag erioed; yr ydym yn hyfforddi llawer mwy o feddygon yn awr, gyda chynnydd o 89 y cant yn nifer y myfyrwyr sy'n cael eu hyfforddi yn ein hysgolion a'n colebau meddygol. Mae'r un peth yn wir am nyrus hefyd. Dyna'r unig ffordd i ehangu'r gallu i drin yn y GIG. Yr ydym yn gwneud y buddsoddiad angenrheidiol yn awr mewn hyfforddi, a byddwn yn gallu medi ffrwyth hynny ar ran cleifion Cymru yn y dyfodol agos.

Ieuan Wyn Jones: It is a bit rich to accuse me of propaganda when your reply was nothing but propaganda. The reality is that I presented you with three targets that you set and have missed. You have not denied that you have missed them; you referred to other targets, which were not in your manifesto. Let us look at the three targets again: will you say whether they were met? These are the kinds of issues on which the people of Wales will judge you on 1 May. On health, there was a specific target—not a promise, a target—that you would reduce waiting times for patients waiting to see a consultant. The number waiting has risen from 21,000 to 76,000—that is a missed target. You also said that wages in Wales would increase—that is a missed target, because wages in Wales are decreasing in relation to the rest of the United Kingdom. You said in the national economic development strategy that GDP per capita in Wales would increase and not decrease. These are three targets that you have missed. Yes or no?

The First Minister: It is always dangerous to believe Plaid Cymru propaganda. Plaid Cymru's leader should pay far more attention to that. The figures show, for example, that unemployment is now lower in Wales than it is in the United Kingdom. That very rarely happens—it has only happened three times in the last 75 years. According to the International Labour Organisation's figures, our unemployment rate is 4.8 per cent while it is 5 per cent in Britain as a whole. We can all take pride in that, whether we are members of the Government or of the opposition parties. Everyone can be proud that unemployment is lower in Wales than it is in the rest of Britain. On the national health service, we continue to invest at record levels; we are training many more doctors, with an 89 per cent increase in the number of students being trained in our medical schools and colleges. The same is also true of nurses. That is the only way to increase our capacity to offer treatment in the NHS. We are making the necessary investment now in training, and we will be able to reap the rewards for the patients of Wales in the near future.

The First Minister: No, absolutely not. Please look at the facts. The last figures for wage differentials showed an improvement in the Welsh average wage relative to the UK average wage. Do please re-examine these figures before you trumpet them around Wales. Similarly, the latest figures on GDP per capita also showed a rise in the Welsh figure relative to that of the UK. On the health service, you are right to refer to the fact that the number of those on waiting lists to see a consultant has risen. The only answer is to make the investment that we are now making by increasing the intake of medical students into our medical and clinical schools by 89 per cent, with similar massive increases in the numbers training as nurses and training for the professions allied to medicine, which are so important in the alternative pathways to treatment. That is why the figures are beginning to turn around. There has been consistent improvement over the last four or five months. The number of patients waiting over 18 months for orthopaedic treatment has fallen by over 2,300 since June 2001—a drop of 98 per cent. These are not propaganda points. They are plain and simple facts and the most up-to-date statistics that we have.

The First Minister: The problem in Wales is one-third of the size of the problem in England, in that the vacancy rate in Wales is 0.4 per cent and it is 1.2 per cent in England. I am sure that you would be delighted to welcome that, Jonathan.

Jonathan Morgan: The First Minister has conveniently glossed over the statistics that

do not make acceptable reading. The National Association of Schoolmasters Union of Women Teachers undertook work last year that demonstrated that 59 per cent of the teaching profession felt that the job was affecting their health. This year, it released figures that suggest that the number of teachers leaving the profession through ill health rose by one fifth during the last academic year. That does not make for good reading. In fact, 40 per cent of the people in Wales who complete an initial teacher-training course do not enter the profession, and at least one in ten posts in secondary schools remain unfilled. Therefore, First Minister, what is being done differently in England?

The First Minister: The situation is much better in Wales than it is in England—there can be no doubt about that. The supply of teachers, relative to the number of posts available, is much healthier in Wales than in England. At 0.4 per cent, not only is the vacancy rate in Wales much lower, one third of the level in England, it is also better than the rate in any region in England. The southwest is the region in the best situation in England, with a vacancy rate of 0.5 per cent. If we had a league table of Wales and the English regions, we would top the league table. It beats me as to why you fail to share my joy that Welsh schools do not have the vacancy rate problem that English schools do. It must be to do with the political party to which you belong.

Mick Bates: Do you agree that this partnership Government, driven by the Liberal Democrats, in fully funding the threshold agreement and the abolition of key—[*Interruption.*]

The Presiding Officer: Order. Every party, even minority parties, must be heard.

Mick Bates: Do you agree that the Government, in fully funding the threshold agreement and abolishing key stage 1 tests, has done more to recruit and retain teachers than was done through all the policies implemented by the Tories and their

The First Minister: I certainly agree with that. However, I am not sure that I entirely agreed with your earlier remarks. Most vehicles have four wheels, and I suppose that the Liberal Democrats could lay claim to one, but it certainly is not the steering wheel.

Helen Mary Jones: First Minister, do you agree that, although there is not a general problem in recruiting and retaining teachers, there are areas where there are problems? Do you also agree that pressure of work is a problem that all teachers refer to, and that that is certainly an issue that drives experienced people out of the profession? Do you share my concern that two important teaching unions in Wales, namely Undeb Cenedlaethol Athrawon Cymru and the National Union of Teachers, have not signed the workload agreement? What is your Government doing to persuade them to sign it? You cannot call it an agreement when half the teachers have not agreed to it.

The First Minister: You are right that there is a problem in recruiting Welsh teachers especially, and also mathematics, physics and general science teachers. Those are the four subjects where there are difficulties and we must try to address that. That is why grant levels, or other financial assistance that we provide in order to persuade people who could become teachers in those subjects to do so, are more favourable than they are for those training to teach other subjects.

On the NUT and UCAC not agreeing with our strategy to lighten the bureaucratic burden on teachers, it is important that we persuade them that our ideas on bringing more people into the classroom are not intended to undermine the status of teachers. When I visit schools in my constituency, Cardiff West, and throughout Wales headteachers always tell me that having an extra pair of hands in the classroom frees up teachers' time, allowing them to give special attention to those who are ahead of the game and those who are falling behind. It is important to have that extra pair of hands in the form of additional non-teaching staff.

Y Gyllideb The Budget

Q5 Peter Black: Will the First Minister make a statement on discussions between the Welsh Assembly Government and the Treasury on the forthcoming budget? (OAQ23797)

The First Minister: As I told the Assembly last week, the Assembly Government, through Edwina Hart, the Finance Minister, presented proposals to the Chancellor in October relating to possible fiscal variations within the UK, especially for the new research and development tax credit, and for changes that would help small firms in Wales. These included reducing the minimum qualifying level for the research and development tax credit.

Peter Black: The partnership Government has introduced many benefits to Wales as a result of devolution. One such benefit is the introduction today of free bus passes for men aged over 60. Do you agree that, had we a fair settlement based on the needs of Wales, we would have many more resources available to do much more for the people of Wales?

The First Minister: You are eliding a fair settlement, and a settlement that means more money, together. We would obviously never refuse more money. When we have needed it, we have argued for it, as we did in the case of Objective 1 funding, and we fortunately secured more money in that case. We are the only administration, pre and post democratic devolution in 1999, that has received money over and above the Barnett formula for specific purposes. We argued for that, which is one of the reasons why Objective 1 has been such a roaring success in Wales, with £1 billion now committed to Objective 1 projects.

Alun Cairns: Since almost all the net new jobs have been created in the public sector, has the First Minister calculated the burden that the increase in national insurance

Y Prif Weinidog: Yr ydych yn cyflysu setliad teg a setliad sy'n golygu y ceir rhagor o arian. Ni fyddem byth yn gwrthod rhagor o arian, wrth gwrs. Pan fu ei angen arnom, gwnaethom ddadlau dros ei gael, fel y gwnaed yn achos cyllid Amcan 1, a buom yn ffodus i sicrhau mwy o arian yn yr achos hwnnw. contributions over the coming financial year will place on the public sector as an employer?

The First Minister: You have not considered what employment categories actually mean. You are looking at the category known as public administration, health and social care. The growth has not been in public administration, but on the health and social care side. There has been no rise in public administration. You must be a little more subtle. The comment that you have made previously, that what has happened in Wales has been a bonanza for bureaucrats, is the height of absurdity. You should look below the surface figures for that category and try not to get over-excited when you see the words 'public administration' and rush to fire off a letter to *The Western Mail*, the *South Wales Evening Post* or whichever. The increase is in employment in health and social care, much of which is, of course, in the private sector.

Janet Ryder: I am sure that you are aware that the percentage of the population that is elderly in Denbighshire and Conwy has now outstripped the percentage in areas such as Bournemouth. One of the factors that makes the biggest impact on elderly people's lives is the level of their pensions. What representations have you made to Westminster on the level of pensions and linking them once again to average earnings?

The First Minister: We have not made such a proposal. That would be a sweeping proposal. I accept that there are strong arguments for it, and many will be attracted by them in the light of what has happened to the pensions industry. Previously, private pensions were overfunded and people cancelled contributions for a year or two as there was so much money in the funds. That was a function of the variations in the stock market. The number of pensioners in Wales is above the UK average. In certain parts of Wales—the north Wales coast and parts of the former Dyfed among them—the percentage is particularly significant. Many of these elderly people will not be on the minimum state pension, nor will they necessarily be eligible for the minimum income guarantee. However, if they are, then we must improve their take-

Q6 Peter Rogers: Can the First Minister make a statement on the availability of play areas to all children in Anglesey? (OAQ23801)

The First Minister: The provision of play areas for children in Anglesey is primarily the responsibility of the Isle of Anglesey County Council, acting in line with the priorities established by the local children and young people's framework partnership. However, we do not presently have a specific proposal on play areas as we do on opening swimming pools in Anglesey leisure centres up to children. I believe that in two weeks' time, when the Easter holidays start, swimming pools in leisure centres will be available free of charge to children, as they will during the summer holidays. I am sure that you, and everyone else, will welcome that, because it makes a major contribution to play, teaches good rather than anti-social behaviour, and is also a good anti-poverty strategy.

Peter Rogers: I am sure you will agree that play deprivation can affect all children, regardless of their socio-economic status. Are you aware that Anglesey is the only Welsh county in which the local authority is not responsible for the maintenance and development of play areas? Last December, a report commissioned by Play Wales unearthed the fact that all of the 57 play areas in Anglesey failed to meet European safety standards. I realise that Communities First and other regeneration efforts have now taken in 10 areas. However, both poor and relatively affluent areas are affected by this. What

action can you take to ensure that play areas are developed across the whole of Wales, are renewed properly and that more is done to help children who have been deprived of play areas?

The fund started out at £1 million in its first two years and stood at £2.7 million in the year that has just finished. I will write to you as to what the budget, for which the council might be eligible to bid, will be for Cymorth starting today. However, Anglesey's allocation last year, from Communities First money, was £480,000.

Eleanor Burnham: We all acknowledge the importance of play opportunities to children's health and development and to keeping them off the streets. Do you agree that the Assembly Government has led the way with the UK's first play policy? Apart from Anglesey, which you have just mentioned, we must commend the opening of swimming pools to children throughout north Wales.

The First Minister: The scheme is being piloted this year. I think that it is open to every local authority to apply to get into the scheme. As far as I am aware, 11 out of 22 local authorities will be opening up swimming pools this Easter and in the summer holidays. However I do not think that there is a restriction. All 22 could do this, if they got their act together in time. In 2004-05 we expect every local authority in Wales to participate in that scheme. Your general point is also correct. Play policy is a suitable subject for us to discuss in the Assembly. It is not below our radar. It is an essential part of good social and education policies and is a good anti-poverty strategy. In so many ways, play contributes to making good citizens for the future. Some people do not realise that and think that it should be left to local authorities, charities or smaller communities

Q7 Alison Halford: What discussions has the First Minister had with the UK Government regarding the conduct of Cardiff county councillors? (OAQ23796)

The First Minister: I am not sure whether that is below the radar or above it. The answer in any case is 'none'.

Alison Halford: It might not be above your radar, First Minister, but Councillor Goodway has told his cabinet colleagues a version of vital financial dealings with the Assembly that cannot be confirmed by his own monitoring officer, the Auditor General for Wales or Assembly records. His version appears in three cabinet minutes. The minutes have been signed by him as representing the truth. Evidence suggests that the Lord Mayor has seriously misled his executive by making statements that appear untrue. The refusal to answer my letters and direct questions on the matter seems to me to bring Wales's biggest council into disrepute. I have therefore made a complaint to his standards committee. Do you agree that all councillors and elected representatives should act with openness and probity at all times?

Wales abide by the code of conduct, and will you undertake to deal appropriately with those whose conduct has fallen below its standards?

The First Minister: That is to do with the structure whereby each council has an independent monitoring officer. Opposition or cabinet members who have doubts about whether what they are doing is in order, can consult the monitoring officer, who is not a member of the executive but who works for the whole council, and can, therefore, give an independent view. The same applies to a standards committee. I believe that most councils in Wales have a standards committee. Cardiff's committee is chaired by Bishop Barry Morgan, the Bishop of Llandaff; the council could not make a better, more independent and more fair-minded choice than Bishop Morgan—I had better add that we are not related. It is important that that degree of independence is secured for opposition members, troubled council officials and, sometimes, troubled backbench members of the council's majority party. That structure exists, as far as I know, in virtually every local authority in Wales.

Owen John Thomas: You will be aware of Cardiff council's policy of restricting communication with Assembly Members to its cabinet ministers only. During the last four years, I have held 140 surgeries in the Cardiff area, and have dealt with hundreds of problems concerning the council. One response took 80 days, and in another case, in relation to a school, it took several letters and over 16 months before even an acknowledgement was received. Do you agree that, as First Minister, you should put pressure on the council to ensure that this unacceptable practice is brought to an end?

The First Minister: I am not sure if you are implying that this practice is unacceptable and also that it is applied by Cardiff council only, because I understand that the authority to the north of Cardiff, Rhondda Cynon Taf, may have the same policy—

C8 Ieuan Wyn Jones: A wnaiff y Prif Weinidog ddatganiad am y rhestrau aros a'r amserau aros yn y GIG yng Nghymru ar hyn o bryd? (OAQ23798)

Y Prif Weinidog: Ers mis Mehefin 2001, cafwyd gostyngiad o dros 2,300 yng nghyfanswm y cleifion sydd yn aros dros 18 mis am driniaeth orthopedig. Fis diwethaf, cafwyd gostyngiad o 30 y cant yn y nifer sydd yn aros dros bedwar mis a thros chwe mis am lawdriniaeth cataractau. O ran llawdriniaeth y galon, mae'r gwasanaeth yn parhau i gyflawni'r targed pwysig na fydd unrhyw glaf yn aros mwy na 12 mis, ac erbyn hyn, mae cyfanswm y bobl sydd yn aros ar ei isaf ers mis Chwefror 1999. Mae'r gwasanaeth yn symud tuag at sicrhau na fydd yn rhaid i unrhyw glaf aros mwy na chwe mis am archwiliad angiograffeg erbyn diwedd Mawrth 2003, sef ddoe. Q8 Ieuan Wyn Jones: Will the First Minister make a statement on the current waiting lists and waiting times in the NHS in Wales? (OAQ23798)

The First Minister: The number of patients waiting over 18 months for orthopaedic treatment has fallen by over 2,300 since June 2001. Numbers waiting over four months and over six months for cataract surgery fell by 30 per cent last month. In cardiac surgery, the service is sustaining the important target that no patient waits longer than 12 months, and the total number of people waiting is now at its lowest since February 1999. The service is on schedule to ensure that, by the end of March 2003, which was yesterday, no patient should have to wait for longer than six months for an angiography investigation. I do not have the most recent figures to hand.

Do you accept responsibility for the awful situation that exists in mid and north Wales, and that it typifies the achievements of this coalition Government?

The First Minister: That is a wonderful hospital; I have visited it myself and know that it provides a superb service. However, I am not aware of any restrictions on the all-Wales money that we are providing, that would mean that it could not be spent on patients who wish to access the superb facilities at Gobowen.

that the way to reduce the number of people on waiting lists is by having more doctors, nurses and beds in the health service? How can you justify spending £15 million on re-organising and restructuring the health service on 1 April 2003? That does nothing more than create more managerial posts. How do you justify that in view of your disastrous record?

The First Minister: We are now moving in the right direction—downwards. The number of people waiting for more than six months has fallen by 6,000 over the last few months. The number of people waiting longer than 18 months has fallen by 20 per cent to 11,700. There is no link between your claim and our plans for restructuring, which will be implemented from today. You are flogging a dead horse. Restructuring has nothing to do with the way you recruit more doctors. We are doing that by increasing the number of students in our medical schools by almost 90 per cent. If you want to train more doctors, you must provide more training places. You cannot deny that we have done that—we have almost doubled the number entering our medical schools.

Former Colliery Sites (Economic Regeneration)

Q9 Brian Hancock: What action has the First Minister taken to promote former colliery sites as economic regeneration sites? (OAQ23803)

The First Minister: There have been outstanding examples of economic regeneration on colliery sites. I am sure that you are familiar with the redevelopment of Oakdale colliery as a high-class business park. Some 400 people work there for General Dynamics UK Ltd, in software and engineering development—

The Presiding Officer: Order. There seems to be a tremendous amount of chattering going on among Members today. The First Minister will be heard properly.

The First Minister: Perhaps Members do not like hearing good news. The figure will increase to 600 people under current proposals from General Dynamics UK Ltd. That is an outstanding example of how to redevelop a coal mine. However, perhaps it takes a Canadian company, like General Dynamics UK Ltd, to see the potential in what others might see as an old coal mine. General Dynamics UK Ltd came along, saw the beautiful woodlands and hill scenery around Oakdale, and decided that this was the place to attract top scientists and engineers to crack a job. That had previously proved impossible when the Bowman contract was held by another company.

Brian Hancock: I agree with you about the Oakdale site—it is a phoenix. However, the commitment that it has had to make is interesting. I have previously raised the question of other potential colliery sites, such as the Navigation Colliery site at Crumlin in the Ebbw valley. Navigation Colliery is on a main road—the A467—it has 100m of railtrack, plenty of space for a park and ride station, and is parallel to the main fibre optic spine. However, it is not considered for economic development use. Meanwhile,

Y Prif Weinidog: Bu enghreifftiau rhagorol o adfywio economaidd ar safleoedd glofeydd. The First Minister: I was sorry to hear about the further job losses at Selectron following the end of mainframe manufacturing of telecommunications equipment there some two years ago. I am making further inquiries as to what has gone wrong with the new strategy of operating as more than just a manufacturing site—manufacturing work was, I believe, moved to a country with much lower wages, such as Hungary—because the company had a strategy for trying to surmount that problem. Far from losing further jobs at Selectron, the company's strategy should have led to the creation of additional jobs. On the general principle that you mentioned about what we do with the Navigation Colliery site, I am not sure that you are right that it is being ignored. My information is that there is a proposal for a sustainable materials centre for that site, which will lead on timber technology. I understand that Caerphilly County Borough Council is the lead body in developing this project and will, in due course, seek funding from Objective 1, the Welsh Development Agency, and Cadw. It is currently preparing a brief for a consultant to develop a business plan for the project.

visited that area—not your side of the constituency boundary, but Gwenda Thomas's side—we looked at some regeneration proposals for old waste tips left behind by either the deep mines or, more likely, by opencast mines in the 1970s and 1980s. We considered their use for quad biking and mountain biking trails. Local teenagers and police were interested in developing their own project for that unique landscape, making it perhaps not quite as stark as it is today, but utilising it in a way that would give teenagers something constructive to do with their surplus energy.

Q10 Ann Jones: Will the First Minister make a statement on the readiness of the emergency services in Wales to deal with the effects of a possible terror attack? (OAQ23789)

The First Minister: The emergency services work closely together through the four joint agency groups in Wales to develop their capability to respond effectively to any major emergencies in their areas. This includes work relating to potential terrorist incidents where existing structures and procedures have been built upon to develop preparedness. You will be aware that there has been reference in the public domain to a major exercise that will take place later this year to test preparedness in north Wales.

Ann Jones: Emergency services in Wales are among the finest, and we should congratulate them on their preparedness for any possible additional work that they may have to undertake. Will you pay particular attention to the coastguard service to ensure that it is not left out of any major emergency plans that may be formed with other emergency services so that our ports are also protected?

The First Minister: We too easily assume, perhaps, that the emergency services only include the fire service, the police and the

Y Prif Weinidog: Mae'r gwasanaethau brys yn cydweithio'n agos drwy'r pedwar grŵp asiantaethau ar y cyd yng Nghymru i ddatblygu eu gallu i ymateb yn effeithiol i unrhyw argyfyngau mawr yn eu hardal. Mae hyn yn cynnwys gwaith sy'n ymwneud â digwyddiadau terfysgol dichonol lle y datblygyd y strwythurau a'r gweithdrefnau presennol i fod yn fwy parod. Byddwch yn ymwybodol bod cyfeiriad wedi bod yn y maes cyhoeddus at ymarfer mawr a fydd yn digwydd yn ddiweddarach eleni i roi prawf ar barodrwydd yn y Gogledd.

Ann Jones: Mae'r gwasanaethau brys yng Nghymru ymysg y goreuon, a dylem eu llongyfarch ar eu parodrwydd ar gyfer unrhyw waith ychwanegol posibl y gallent orfod ei gyflawni. ambulance service. There are other uniformed services, such as the coastguard service, which are also important.

David Lloyd: A allwch gadarnhau bod y deunydd angenrheidiol ar gael ar lawr gwlad i'n gwasanaethau brys allu ymateb i ymosodiad terfysgol?

Y Prif Weinidog: Mae'n bosibl paratoi, gwella paratoadau a darparu hyfforddiant o bryd i'w gilydd i sicrhau bod y cynlluniau sy'n bodoli yn ddigon cryf i ddelio â'r bygythiad terfysgol diweddaraf. Dyna pam y mae'n rhaid inni gynnal ymarferion o bryd i'w gilydd, fel yn y Gogledd yn ystod yr haf.

David Ian Jones: You are no doubt aware that a train carrying nuclear material travels weekly along the north Wales coast from Wylfa to Sellafield and back. Do you not agree that an attack on that train would place an intolerable burden on the emergency services in north Wales? Do you not agree also that, in the current international climate, it would be sensible for that train shipment to be stopped?

The First Minister: If it were stopped, an alternative route to the reprocessing facility at Sellafield would have to be found. I would guess that an analysis has been carried out as to whether a marine route could be used to take the material safely and directly from Wylfa to Sellafield and that a decision has been taken that that is not feasible or not as safe as using the railways. Trains are considered to be just about the safest means of transporting dangerous or flammable materials because there are far fewer opportunities for uncontrolled crossing with other vehicles on the railways. They do not work perfectly at all times, but on any statistical basis, trains are the safest means of transport. I presume that that is why they use the railways, but I will write to the Member on that point.

Y Prif Weinidog: Nid oes unrhyw dystiolaeth ar hyn o bryd sy'n dangos y bydd y rhyfel yn dod yn fater o arwyddocâd domestig yng Nghymru. Mae'r holl wasanaethau cyhoeddus yn parhau i ddatblygu cynlluniau ar gyfer parhau i gyflawni eu swyddogaethau angenreidiol yn wyneb unrhyw her a fydd yn effeithio arnynt. Yn gyffredinol, nid yw'r rhyfel yn gosod unrhyw her newydd i'r cynlluniau a wnaethpwyd eisoes a'r ffordd y darperir gwasanaethau cyhoeddus yng Nghymru.

Dafydd Wigley: Gan dderbyn eich ateb, dyna'r cyfle olaf sydd gennych i fod yn agored gyda phobl Cymru. A wnewch ddatgan a oeddech yn cefnogi mynd i ryfel gydag Irac heb fandad y Cenhedloedd Unedig?

Y Prif Weinidog: Bûm yn agored eisoes, ond dywedaf eto fy mod yn cefnogi penderfyniad y Prif Weinidog i roi'r hawl i'r Senedd bleidleisio o blaid neu yn erbyn bwriad y Llywodraeth. Mae'r materion hynny yn berthnasol i'r Senedd a dylid cynnal pleidleisiau arnynt yno, er na chafwyd pleidlais hyd dair wythnos yn ôl. The First Minister: There is no evidence at present that indicates that the war will become an issue of domestic significance in Wales. All public services continue to develop plans for the continuation of their critical business functions in the face of any disruptive challenge. Generally, the war does not present any new challenges to the plans that have already been put in place and the way that public services are provided in Wales.

Dafydd Wigley: While accepting your answer, this is your final opportunity to be open with the people of Wales. Will you state whether you supported going to war with Iraq without a United Nations mandate?

The First Minister: I have already been open, but I repeat that I support the Prime Minister's decision to give Parliament the right to vote for or against the Government's proposed course of action. Those issues are relevant to Parliament and should be voted upon there, although a vote was not held until three weeks ago. I am pleased that the Prime Minister made that historic constitutional change to give Parliament the right to vote on these issues for the first time. Once Parliament had voted, there was no need for anyone else to express an opinion or take a vote.

The Presiding Officer: Order. Points of order should usually be raised after statements, but if it is relevant now, I will allow it.

Cynog Dafis: It is relevant to Carwyn Jones's answer to my comments on the business statement. I raise this point of order under Standing Order No. 2.7, concerning ministerial responsibility.

Last week, I requested a statement from the Minister for Education and Lifelong Learning regarding a report that the Welsh Joint Education Committee will have to repay £1.5 million to the European Commission, because of discrepancies in its European unit. Carwyn Jones rejected my request on the basis that the WJEC is not an Assembly sponsored public body.

The WJEC is an unique body, set up by statute in the 1940s. Its status was changed fundamentally by the Education Act 1993, but the WJEC is our national examining board and it is difficult to comprehend how we can sustain our public examinations system without it or, indeed, how we can deliver the Curriculum Cymreig, that is, the Welsh aspects of the national curriculum. It is a key body central to the Minister's education system. It is irresponsible of her, or the Business Minister, to wash their hands of this.

Presiding Officer, I ask you to rule. Is it appropriate to insist that the Minister make a statement on the effect of recent reported events concerning the financial wellbeing of the WJEC?

The Presiding Officer: Thank you for that point of order and for raising the matter with me previously. As far as I can see, it is for Ministers to decide, voluntarily or under pressure, whether to make a statement to the Assembly or to Committee on any matter. However, there is no doubt that it is appropriate for the Assembly to discuss the Welsh Joint Education Committee, which is an important national body and whose future is a matter that affects Wales. Section 33 of the Government of Wales Act 1998 enables us to consider and make representations on any matter that affects Wales.

Cynog Dafis: Further to that point of order, and with all due respect, the Business Minister is not on firm ground, therefore, in suggesting that it is not appropriate to make a statement on the WJEC on the grounds that it is not an Assembly sponsored public body. That has nothing to do with it.

The Presiding Officer: That is not exactly what I said, as you will see if you read the Record tomorrow. What I said was that it is a matter for Ministers to decide, in their wisdom and in executing their responsibilities, on which matters they make statements if the matter is within their remit. Obviously, had a debate on matters involving the WJEC been arranged in this Assembly, or if such a debate is arranged in the next Assembly, that would be in order, and I would assume that the Minister responsible would want to respond to

Statement on the Establishment of a Disability and Special Educational Needs Tribunal for Wales

The Minister for Education and Lifelong Learning (Jane Davidson): In ‘The Learning Country’ I first expressed my intention to develop for Wales a distinct special educational needs tribunal. The Education Act 2002 amends the Education Act 1996 to allow for the establishment of a special educational needs tribunal for Wales—tribiwnlys anghenion addysgol arbennig Cymru.

The current tribunal, which operates on an England and Wales basis, was established in 1993 and, last year, under provisions in the Special Educational Needs and Disability Act 2002, was reconstituted to become the SEN and disability tribunal. Under existing arrangements, the Assembly Government makes a contribution to the programme and running costs of the England and Wales tribunal.

I am pleased today to acknowledge the important role that the existing England and Wales tribunal has played since its inception. Parental recourse to appeal against local authority decisions about assessment, provision and delivery of education for children with SEN is an important right. It certainly sits easily with the Assembly Government’s policies of focusing on parental and pupil inclusion in the decision-making processes that affect pupils.

Much, though, has changed since 1993. Establishing the National Assembly for Wales and the consequent devolution of educational matters to the Assembly Government—including, of course, special educational needs—is a prime example. It befits a modern, post-devolution Wales to have institutions that reflect the particular needs, conditions and aspirations of the country.

Since April 2002, Wales has, for the first time, had its own distinctive special educational needs code of practice. The code gives guidance on the assessment of, and

provision for, special educational needs. Local education authorities and schools must have regard to the code and, where there have been departures from it, parents may appeal to the tribunal. Before making an appeal, however, we would expect parents to have been offered an opportunity to avail themselves of the authority's disagreement resolution service, as set out in the code of practice. This neutral service aims to avoid the polarisation of positions. Using it does not, of course, preclude parents from making an appeal to the tribunal. The SEN code of practice for Wales is distinct from the code in England and, to cater for these differences and possible further incremental divergence in the future, it seems entirely logical to establish a separate and distinct tribunal.

The Welsh tribunal is to be established from today, 1 April, with its administrative headquarters in Llandrindod Wells. It will consider appeals from 1 September and will hear them in locations across Wales within prescribed timescales. The first appeals are likely to be heard in December. Under interim arrangements, the existing SENDIST will continue to hear appeals received before 1 September. In the case of disability, which is not a devolved function, the Welsh tribunal will hear such appeals against perceived discrimination on the basis of disability under licence. It will, therefore, need to do so against England and Wales criteria.

I should stress that although its operation will be funded wholly by the Assembly, the decisions reached by the tribunal will continue to be independent of Government. The current regulations covering the operation of the tribunal took account of the future establishment of the Wales tribunal and will, in the first instance at least, govern the appeals processes for both tribunals. I am awaiting information from the Lord Chancellor's department about the outcomes of recent interviews to appoint a fee-paid, part-time president for the tribunal. The secretariat of the tribunal will remain a civil

Once it is staffed, the tribunal will have an important opportunity to establish user-groups to ensure that the needs of all stakeholders, be they parents, pupils, local education authorities or support groups, are taken fully into account. There is a clear opportunity to learn from and build upon the existing good practice. I also am keen that the tribunal should be able to function bilingually, from dealing with initial enquiries to lodging appeals, to having them resolved and being informed of decisions. The current tribunal has a Welsh language scheme, which provides for hearing appeals in either language, but the establishment of a new tribunal will allow for any necessary modifications to be made.

The president will prepare an annual report, and this will provide information about language as well as other appeal trends in different parts of the country. That data will be important, not least in determining appeal prevalence, possible areas of shortcoming and the mapping of future special educational needs provision.

I trust that the tribunal will continue to provide an important service and that it will offer the capacity to adapt to changes in the field of Welsh special educational needs. Therefore, I warmly commend it to you.

Jonathan Morgan: Thank you for the advance copy of your statement. As I have said previously, I welcome the establishment of the special educational needs tribunal under the Education Act 2002. It was long overdue, and it will be good for Wales and for those parents in Wales who are concerned about the nature of educational provision for their children with special educational needs. The tribunal will perform a vital part of the process of ensuring that natural justice is done when parents are concerned about the level and type of education provision that their children need.

authorities' disagreement resolution service, which is a good idea, as is ensuring that there is no polarisation of positions; that is somewhat easier said than done. Often, LEAs will not budge from their decisions, and parents can become entrenched in their own beliefs and assertions. After all, they are arguing, often forcibly, on behalf of their children. Parents wish only to see the best for their children, and no-one can blame them for that. Therefore, I understand the need for that service.

The length of time that it takes to complete the statementing process, which is not necessarily related to the establishment of the tribunal itself, but is a concern that parents often raise with me. We all understand the various procedures, we know of the professionals and bodies which need to be involved in that process, but it can take up to 26 or 28 weeks to complete—that is an inordinate length of time. Will the Government of Wales commission a study to determine whether that could be done much more quickly? At least parents and children would then be provided with the required level of care and education much earlier than is currently the case.

Jane Davidson: I appreciate your endorsement of the tribunal. It is important also to acknowledge that the Huw Roberts report, which looked specifically at the needs of those children who want education provision through the medium of Welsh, expressly called for the establishment of our own tribunal in Wales.

I share your concern whether people who want to access the right support for their children know where to go to receive it. I remain concerned that, although the code of practice has been in place since 1 April 2002, people are not necessarily aware of it. As a constituency Member, I have sent out codes of practice to parents, as have others in the Chamber, and I have encouraged them to contact organisations such as the special needs advisory project for advice on the statementing process. We need to encourage a real level of honesty throughout the entire education service in Wales so that LEAs know what their function is and so that

schools can advise parents on children's rights. The user groups that will be established alongside the tribunal will go a long way to ensuring that the views of those groups are clearly presented. They will therefore ensure, through the reports of the tribunal's president to the Assembly, that we can constantly consider these issues and whether or not we need to amend the code of guidance. In the longer term, I would be unhappy to end up in a situation where every child with special educational needs was treated on the back of a statement, which is a complex process. Even though we have reduced the stages of the statement, such a process still takes a substantial period of time. We need to consider how to intervene earlier so that children receive the right educational provision, thereby avoiding the need to be heard by a tribunal.

Peter Law: I warmly welcome this announcement, which will be in the interest of children throughout Wales, particularly those who need help. In the case of children from deprived communities who require special educational needs provision, can you assure me that, in order to ensure justice, adequate support will be available for parents who have difficulty in articulating a case before a tribunal?

Jane Davidson: It is important that parents feel adequately supported when they go before the tribunal. Even though the tribunal headquarters will be based in Llandrindod Wells, it will hear cases in local communities so that young people do not have to travel far to have their cases heard.

Helen Mary Jones: We warmly welcome the statement and the establishment of the tribunal. Addressing some of the historical injustices that our children and young people with special educational needs have faced has been a cross-party priority. We welcome the advent of the tribunal in that context. However, do you share my concerns—and from your response to Jonathan Morgan, it seems that you do—that many parents still encounter problems getting appropriate statements, and adequate provision once they have got their statements? What are your views on how a future Minister should act if disparities in the performance of county

I have two further specific questions. On the relationship between the tribunals and hearings on disability and given the Assembly's statutory duty to promote equality of opportunity, do you agree that it would be appropriate at some point to seek to devolve disability issues given that part of their enforcement is now being funded by the Assembly? Do you believe that the future Minister should monitor the cost of hearings on non-devolved matters? If we find that this tribunal, which the Assembly is funding, undertakes a great deal of work for the department in London, perhaps we should seek some redress for that given that these tribunals are expensive.

Finally, on operations through the medium of Welsh, I welcome your comments that the current scheme could be adapted. Many parents would like access to hearings through the medium of Welsh rather than translated hearings because everyone else is speaking English. That would have been difficult to achieve under the old arrangements. Will you give us a commitment that you will seek—or you believe that the next Minister should seek—for parents to be heard through the medium of Welsh, if that is their language of choice or, importantly, if it is the young person's language of choice bearing in mind what you have already said about involving children and young people in the process of

Jane Davidson: This Government has gone further than any other government in tackling special educational needs in Wales. We have set up an all-Wales advisory group, established co-ordinators and have used Wales-only powers in the Education Act 2002 with regard to the tribunal. We are also considering regional partnerships between local authorities. For example, Ysgol Plas Bron Dyffryn in north Wales received additional capital funding to be developed as a regional centre of excellence for autism. We are considering similar projects in other parts of Wales and encouraging local authorities to work in partnership.

Any future Minister will want to ensure that local authorities work in partnership to deliver this agenda. It is not about individual local authorities, because one cannot predict where children with low-incidence special educational needs will be born. We must have the right partnerships and collaborations to take this agenda forward. However, we are doing much more work than ever before. That is in addition to the partnership work that I am undertaking with my colleague, Jane Hutt, to create extra places for therapists, extra training opportunities and investment; we will be consulting on that work shortly.

To clarify, the disability elements of the tribunal will be recharged to the Department for Education and Skills, because it is not a devolved function. I want to ensure, as always, that this will be cost neutral, and that the Assembly does not have to pick up costs that should properly be met by our colleagues in Westminster. The message for a future Minister is that this is an important issue, and that we must carry on with the work that we have started. We will need additional investment in health, social care and education in the longer term to tackle these needs. We must also ensure that parents

That is an important principle for the Assembly Government and is why the Huw Roberts report was so important, so that we can take that agenda forward.

Gareth Jones: I welcome the establishment of this tribunal. We have been asking for it over the years. I ask you to clarify one point. You refer to the fact that the tribunal's decisions will be independent of Government—that is the phrase that you use, and I understand what you mean to some extent. However, what legal status will these decisions have? Will they have statutory force, which will impel local authorities to abide by those decisions, or will they be similar to the ineffectual, toothless statements of the Children's Commissioner for Wales, who makes important statements that are disregarded by local government?

The Business Minister (Carwyn Jones): Point of order. Last week, there was some confusion when a debate was curtailed just before the short debate. Standing Order No. 6.3(v) states that when a debate runs out of time before the short debate is to begin, then that motion lapses. However, Standing Order No. 6.14 states that at the conclusion of any debate, the motion should be put to the vote. The difficulty last week has been clarified, and there is no immediate problem. However, for clarity's sake, will you give a

The Presiding Officer: I am grateful to the Business Minister for giving me notice that he was going to raise this issue. I have studied the Record of Proceedings and am content that proceedings were conducted in accordance with Standing Orders. However, if Members feel that Standing Orders, as drafted at present, are open to different interpretations—and the Business Minister expressed that feeling today—I will ask the Business Committee in the next Assembly to examine the wording of the relevant Standing Order, so that we can remove any uncertainty or ambiguity that might exist.

Carwyn Jones: Thank you, Llywydd, for that clarification.

My second point of order is as follows. In any system of governance—this applies at a UK level and should also apply in Wales—there are occasions when documents are provided to elected Members in confidence. It is an accepted part of the agreement between Government and the opposition that where the Government is in a position to have sight of confidential documents, or where such documents are only available to certain Assembly Members, then only those Members should have sight of them. It is akin, perhaps, to Privy Council terms in Westminster. It was therefore of great concern to me to learn that an Audit Committee report that was, and remains, confidential was leaked to the BBC last week, almost immediately after the Audit Committee was seized of the report. That constitutes a clear and serious breach of confidence regarding the Audit Committee and holds the Chamber in contempt. I choose those words deliberately.

Firstly, the leak is discourteous to the Chair. The Chair of the Committee, Dafydd Wigley, is retiring from full-time politics after serving

Carwyn Jones: Diolch ichi, Lywydd, am yr eglurhad hwnnw.

It is courtesy at a high level indeed.

Who gave that report to the BBC? I have been given a name, but I will not embarrass that person by naming that person today. I hope that that person comes forward. However, I call on each party in the Chamber to declare now that no member of their group leaked the report to the BBC. I note that Jonathan Morgan produced the document in the Chamber this afternoon and I challenge him directly to state from where he got a copy of that document. I will await his reply before I rise to make further points regarding this point of order.

I am extremely concerned that there appears to have been a serious breach. I know that there are other Members in the Chamber, from many parties, who also wish to make this point. Ultimately, we must remember that it is easy for parties to try to make political capital out of confidential reports, but the majority of Members have not sought to do so, and those Members represent more than one political party. Llywydd, I may have a further point to make on this point of order, depending upon what is said by Members in the Chamber.

The Presiding Officer: Order. Before we pursue this matter further I would like to make it clear that I, as I stated earlier this afternoon, deplore any leaks from a Committee and quotations from leaked reports. However, if there has been a breach of our Standing Orders we have a procedure whereby Members may be called to account by the Committee on Standards of Conduct, and I believe that that procedure is to be preferred to debating this issue publicly in the Assembly Chamber.

Jocelyn Davies: Further to this point of order, I place on public record that no Plaid Cymru members of the Audit Committee—Dafydd Wigley, Janet Davies and myself—have made this report available to the press or anyone else, including other members of our group. We have kept the confidentiality of the report; we take the Audit Committee's work seriously. I know that you have said that this is a matter for the Committee on Standards of Conduct, but we want this matter laid to rest today.

Janice Gregory: Further to this point of order, as a member of Audit Committee, I was outraged to see on *Dragon's Eye* on Thursday evening that a report had been leaked to the BBC. I cannot stress enough how disgraceful the actions of that member of the Audit Committee are—or, indeed, the actions of someone from the National Audit

Jones's feelings on the issue. It has been exceptionally unfortunate, not only for the Committee, but also for the Assembly and for Sir John Bourn himself, because the item on television referred to the report as if it were a report by the Auditor General himself. In fact, it was a draft that was to come before the Committee to be developed into a Committee report. It was also, I understand, a draft that did not truly reflect the discussions that had taken place in Committee. Therefore, to use it was misleading as well as being discourteous to the Committee. When I saw the programme, I asked the Clerk to the Assembly, Paul Silk, to set up a thorough investigation into the matter. In accordance with the advice that I have received, I have written to those people who may have had sight or have received a copy of the report in their possession. I hope that, in this way, we will get to the bottom of the matter. It would be easier for all those who could be under suspicion if the individual responsible for this were to admit it—whether it be an accident or, worse still, an act of commission. If it was an act of commission, I suggest—although it is not a matter for me as I am standing down from the Assembly—that, when the Audit Committee is reconstituted in the next Assembly, any Member found guilty of such an act should not be included.

Office are, because, at this moment, we are all under suspicion. I am confident that it was not a Labour member of the Audit Committee, or a member of the Labour Party staff, who leaked this report. I thank Dafydd Wigley, as Chair of the Audit Committee, for taking such swift action. I e-mailed several people on Thursday night to tell them how outraged I was by this incident. There is no doubt that this leak is political posturing. It is an attempt to bring an Assembly sponsored public body into disrepute during an election campaign, which is even more outrageous.

The Presiding Officer: I am not anxious to prolong this discussion. It is an important issue and, as has been pointed out, we have procedures to deal with it that have already been put into effect.

Kirsty Williams: Further to this point of order, on behalf of the Liberal Democrat group, I agree with the comments already made. I have discussed this matter with the Liberal Democrat member of the Audit Committee, who is deeply shocked by what has happened. As a former member of the Audit Committee, I know how important these working arrangements are for the Committee to work properly. Behaviour of this kind, as Dafydd Wigley rightly said, undermines that Committee and the Assembly as a whole.

William Graham: Further to this point of order, I reiterate and endorse the comments made. For the record, no member of the Welsh Conservative group was guilty of improper conduct—[*Interruption.*]

The Presiding Officer: Order. I have indicated that I do not wish for this point of order to become an opportunity to air issues that are more appropriately and properly considered by a full investigation.

William Graham: For the record, I confirm that no member of the Welsh Conservative group used any documentation improperly and, in this particular instance, was unaware of its existence until it arrived.

In those days, the fastest carrier was a horse and rider; today we have almost instant transmission of information, not only throughout the United Kingdom, but throughout the world.

Some time ago, I looked up who the Lords Lieutenant were, because I thought that I had a subjective impression that they were preponderantly upper class, or even aristocratic, people. I wanted to disprove my ideas, but I failed. Even in Wales, which is the most egalitarian of the four countries of the United Kingdom, my impressions were confirmed, despite one or two notable exceptions.

That concern can be addressed over time. What cannot be addressed under the Government of Wales Act 1998 is the existence of such an outdated system. I remember trying to explain it to an Oberbürgermeister from a town in southern Germany. He was mystified, but thrilled to meet such an important person. He had no doubts about where power lay in quaint old Britain.

This motion concerns the preserved counties' boundaries. The archaic system of establishment control that operates through these boundaries is even odder than Orders on Egyptian potatoes and spider crabs.

David Davies: Point of order. I cannot see what any of that had to do with the debate on preserved boundaries. That seemed to be a jackanory account of *The Lord of the Rings*.

The Presiding Officer: I can assure David Davies that, if the matter were out of order—even at this late stage in our Assembly proceedings—it would not pass the attention of my advisers or myself. That was—and still is—a debate about preserved matters.

William Graham: Before I discuss this motion, I will counter some of Janet Davies's remarks, which were an extraordinary attack on people who are, in reality, volunteers who do sterling work throughout our counties, not

The commission considered the representations in full, and decided that Caerphilly should be included in Gwent, because, although Caerphilly has an affinity to Merthyr Tydfil, it has closer ties with the Rhymney area, including Tredegar and Ebbw Vale, which are in the preserved county of Gwent. Gwent police and health authority have jurisdiction in the unitary authority of Caerphilly, and the local authority itself is in favour of being included in Gwent. I have asked local government officials to consider these issues, so that the necessary parliamentary work can be undertaken.

The Assembly Government has the power to issue guidance to local authorities to assist in the exercise of its functions relating to the allocation of accommodation, homelessness, and the prevention of homelessness. As a result of the recent changes to allocations and homelessness legislation made by the Homelessness Act 2002, the Assembly Government needed to revise its existing statutory guidance. The revised guidance reflects the amendments made by the Homelessness Act 2002 and also the priority need Order, which came into effect on 1 March 2001. It explains how local authorities should meet their responsibilities when providing allocation and homelessness services. The guidance also reflects the policy positions established in previous consultations, such as that by the Homelessness Commission, and the Lettings Sounding Board. The revised code of guidance was issued for consultation in October 2002 to a wide range of voluntary and statutory agencies working with the social housing sector. The consultation period expired on 17 January, and 14 responses were received. Additional discussions took place on the guidance at a consultation event in Swansea in January, where debate focused on creating joined-up solutions at the local level.

Local Government and Housing Committee members considered an earlier draft of the code of guidance on 29 January. Officials noted the observations raised by the Committee, and addressed these in the final version before you today. The code of guidance provides detailed technical guidance needed or requested by local authorities—indeed, this is one area where the Assembly Government has been asked to provide an even more prescriptive framework. I am pleased to report that the code of guidance has been favourably received by the statutory and voluntary sectors.

The Assembly Government recognises the existing pressures on local authority housing stock, and has recently made secondary legislation reducing the maximum discount limit on right to buy properties, which has come into effect. The Assembly Government will only be able to review the need for additional resources in the light of the local homelessness strategies in September this year. I ask Members to support the motions.

William Graham: I propose the following amendments to NDM1453 in the name of Jonathan Morgan. Amendment 1: add a new point at the end of the motion:

acknowledges its failure to engage with independent housing providers in planning to solve the problem of homelessness.

The code of guidance is, in many ways, a missed opportunity, in that it details procedures of good office practice. The need for such a comprehensive code either indicates the failure of our local authorities to implement good office practices, or the failure of the Welsh Assembly Government to ensure uniformity of procedures throughout Wales. We all recognise that being homeless must be the worst level of social exclusion and deprivation. The code of guidance assesses how the problem should have been administered, and outlines the good management practices that support the administrative process. The introduction to this code clearly specifies the reliance on

good management practice and informs local authorities that the code is not a substitute for legislation, that they need to be familiar with the statutory provisions and that they need to keep in touch with appropriate developments.

The Welsh Conservative group has continually outlined the diminishing role of local authorities in providing homes for people in Wales. We have demonstrated their inefficiency in housing management, particularly—

Peter Black: I am fascinated by the Conservative amendment deplored the decrease in local authority homes, given that it was your party that introduced the right to buy scheme. How do you reconcile that amendment with the policy in your manifesto, published yesterday, to extend the right to buy scheme around Wales?

William Graham: I will deal with your question in my comments.

The main housing provider in Wales is the independent sector. It continues to react to the demand for housing and to meet the aspirations of the majority of tenants who seek to own their own home. In answer to Peter Black's question, the homes sold by local authorities across Wales have not disappeared: many are let to tenants and many are owner-occupied. They have not disappeared.

Peter Black: Is it not the case that one reason why people have difficulty in finding a house, particularly when they are in difficulties or suffering from social exclusion, is because there are no adequate homes available to rent?

William Graham: I agree with your point, but many Welsh local authorities have a large number of homes that are unavailable to homeless people or to anyone else. You will know that vast numbers of houses in local authority ownership in Cardiff are empty and not available to rent.

Janet Ryder: I am bemused by your persistence in insisting that you can pursue a

Janet Ryder: Yr wyf mewn penbleth yngylch y ffaith eich bod yn dal i fynnu y

right-to-buy policy without curtailing an authority's ability to offer rented accommodation. You have not explained that fully in answer to Peter Black's question. There is a difference between what you are trying to achieve through the amendment and what you say in your manifesto.

William Graham: The manifesto is clear. You will know that, during our period in Government, huge sums of money were allocated from local authorities to registered social landlords to provide the sort of housing that we are discussing today. [*Interruption.*] I will not pursue that point further.

If we are to tackle homelessness we should not look backwards and attempt to fit the homeless into a diminishing number of properties. We should not handcuff local authorities. We must provide social housing through registered social landlords. That is the aim in 'Better Homes for People in Wales', which we have endorsed.

The homeless in rural Wales deserve more than to be dismissed with a comment in the homelessness strategy, stating that:

'the Assembly Government will support the development of good practice in the provision of homelessness services in rural areas.'

I acknowledge that the Minister has brought forward measures in the Assembly that will hopefully help to reduce those significant problems in rural areas. Local authorities and this administration have failed to deliver improvements to our housing stock. The supply of new housing for low-income families has fallen by a third. That has a major impact in Wales because of the disproportionate number of people on lower incomes. In fact, 8.7 per cent of all Welsh housing stock fails to meet the decent homes standard, which affects the vulnerable.

Local authorities in Wales currently spend less on social housing than they did in 1999 and, although there has been an increase during the last two years, it fails to make up

for the reduction in the first two years of this Assembly. We note, with concern, that the number of evictions is increasing and, although the code of guidance outlines procedures for dealing with anti-social behaviour, it reflects on the problem without promoting a solution. The strategy talks through the problems, but fails to deliver policies to resolve the matter. We need to ensure that, together, we plan for integrated developments that incorporate the provision of additional social housing. We wish to increase the choice available to those seeking social housing and a better standard of accommodation, and encourage people to become fully integrated in our communities.

Janet Ryder: Can you confirm that we are having two debates on this issue and that this debate is on the guidance issued to local authorities?

The Finance Minister (Edwina Hart): Yes.

Janet Ryder: Thank you for clarifying that, Minister.

As was said in Committee, this guidance sets the parameters within which local authorities will operate this homelessness strategy and their allocation strategies. However, I will raise two concerns; I know that they have been raised in Committee, but they persist. The first is that homeless people and those living in refuges, particularly women, should be made aware that they have a choice of accommodation. They are not obliged to take the first place offered to them; it is often not suitable for their needs. Housing officials need to be trained to raise awareness of that guidance among those seeking accommodation. Secondly, we must consider joint waiting lists between housing associations and councils. We do not want to face the problem of people waiting on a council list without having also applied to the local housing association. One housing list would counter that problem.

That leads me to speak to the Tory amendments. We will discuss the delivery of the homelessness strategy in the next debate. It is difficult to deliver initiatives such as this

without working with partners, but I wonder at the involvement of independent providers. We are talking mainly about accommodation for homeless people, not executive flats built on greenfield sites. People need good-quality housing. I have found that independent providers offer houses of multiple occupation with living standards that are not always that high. Plaid Cymru is happy to work with the independent sector to develop an adequately strong licensing scheme, which would ensure good-quality accommodation across all sectors, whether via independent providers, housing associations, or local authorities. Some independent providers have not given the sector a good reputation, and we would like to see those few people—or perhaps not so few—dealt with.

On amendment 2 in the name of Jonathan Morgan, there has been a decrease in social housing and Plaid Cymru deplores the lack of expenditure on it. However, as Peter Black said, this matter goes back to the sell-off of council housing that led to the stock shortage. Who started that policy and who would not let capital receipts be used for new build? The blame falls squarely at the feet of the Conservative Party. It is hypocritical of them to talk about a lack of social housing when one of their main policies—one that they continue to pursue—restricts the availability of social housing.

Eleanor Burnham: The Welsh Liberal Democrats are pleased to support this motion, as we should do everything in our power to reduce homelessness, which perpetuates social exclusion and deprivation. It is fundamental that local authorities establish their homelessness strategies to tackle this unacceptable situation. It is important that homeless people contribute to local strategy development.

The Assembly Government recommends the development of community housing agreements, and good advice is a cornerstone of the prevention of homelessness. Good advice should be accompanied by appropriate assistance, including advocacy services. Local authorities and registered social landlords must be allowed the flexibility to

The Finance Minister (Edwina Hart): I will concentrate on the issues relating to the technical guidance and the Orders. William made a point about regulation in general, but local authorities requested this technical guidance. It is one instance of them wanting more regulation. Following discussion in Committee, we will send a loose-leaf binder to local authorities. Revisions are always made to such Orders, and so new regulations can simply be placed in the binder, with a note showing the date of revision.

On Janet's point, affording women in refuges a choice of accommodation is an issue, and raising awareness of that choice will require particular training. There will be issues arising from stock transfer. I hope that our work in north and south Wales on lettings policies and our work in the social housing market between housing associations and local authorities will have a positive impact on people's ability to choose the type of accommodation in which they want to live. I commend the regulations to Members.

Strategaeth Ddigartrefedd Genedlaethol National Homelessness Strategy

The Deputy Presiding Officer: I have selected amendments 1, 3, 4 and 5 in the name of Jonathan Morgan and amendment 2 in the name of Jocelyn Davies.

The Finance Minister (Edwina Hart): I propose that

the National Assembly for Wales resolves to adopt the national strategy to tackle homelessness in Wales, which was e-mailed to Members on 25 March 2003. (NDM1455)

The Assembly Government is committed to providing good quality homes for people who are unable to buy or rent in the private sector or cannot afford to do so. Clearly, local authorities have a key role to play in this. In their leadership role, they must ensure that there is adequate affordable housing locally and must strategically manage homelessness within their areas of operation. In their service provider role, local authorities must also improve lettings services to people who need affordable housing and assist those who are homeless.

We recognise the considerable pressures on

Mae Llywodraeth y Cynulliad wedi ymrwymo i ddarparu tai o ansawdd da ar gyfer pobl na allant brynu neu rentu yn y sector preifat neu sy'n methu â fforddio gwneud hynny. Mae'n amlwg bod rôl allweddol yn hyn o beth i awdurdodau lleol. Yn eu rôl fel arweinydd, rhaid iddynt sicrhau bod digon o dai fforddiadwy yn lleol a rhaid iddynt reoli digartrefedd yn strategol yn eu hardaloedd gweithredu. Yn ogystal â hynny, yn eu rôl fel darparwr gwasanaethau, rhaid i awdurdodau lleol wella eu gwasanaethau gosod ar gyfer pobl y mae arnynt angen tai fforddiadwy a helpu'r rhai sy'n ddigartref.

Yr ydym yn cydnabod y pwysau mawr sydd

many local authorities' housing stock, but we need clearer information on local needs. The Assembly Government will review the need for additional resources once the local authorities have completed their local homelessness reviews and strategies.

Those in housing need, who are unable to access affordable housing, represent some of society's most excluded people. We are therefore committed to empowering people in housing need to secure appropriate accommodation and to supporting that as much as possible. It must also be accommodation of their own choosing. Our short-term target is to eliminate the need for anyone to sleep rough. Our long-term aim is to ensure that high-quality housing is available for all.

Members are familiar with the recommendations made by the Homelessness Commission, of which there were 91 in all. As a direct result of a recommendation made by the commission, the Assembly Government produced a draft national strategy on homelessness, which was issued for consultation in May 2002. We received 29 responses to that consultation paper, from both statutory and voluntary organisations. The Assembly Government sponsored a major conference in January to focus debate on future priorities and to fine-tune our strategic approach.

The draft strategy was reported to the Local Government and Housing Committee in April 2002, before it was issued for consultation. In addition, the strategy has been drafted in consultation with the homelessness strategies working group, which is a national advisory group that includes representation from the Welsh Local Government Association and other practitioners.

As Members know, Assembly Government policy is guided by three principal themes—sustainability, equality and tackling social disadvantage. Each of these themes underlies the development of this strategy—housing must be sustainable or people may become homeless, fair access to housing and related services will help to prevent and alleviate

Mae Aelodau'n gyfarwydd â'r argymhellion a wnaed gan y Comisiwn Digartrefedd, yr oedd cyfanswm o 91 ohonynt. O ganlyniad i argymhelliaid gan y comisiwn, lluniodd Llywodraeth y Cynulliad strategaeth genedlaethol ddrafft ar ddigartrefedd, a ddosbarthwyd ar gyfer ymgynghori ym Mai 2002. Cawsom 29 o ymatebion i'r papur ymgynghori hwnnw, oddi wrth gyrrff statudol a gwirfoddol. Noddodd Llywodraeth y Cynulliad gynhadledd bwysig yn Ionawr i ganolbwytio'r drafodaeth ar flaenoriaethau ar gyfer y dyfodol ac i fanwl gyweirio ein strategaeth.

Rhoddwyd adroddiad ar y strategaeth ddrafft i'r Pwyllgor Llywodraeth Leol a Thai yn Ebrill 2002, cyn ei dosbarthu ar gyfer ymgynghori. Yn ogystal â hynny, mae'r strategaeth wedi'i drafftio drwy ymgynghori â'r gweithgor strategaethau digartrefedd, sy'n grŵp ymgynghorol cenedlaethol ac yn cynnwys cynrychiolwyr o Gymdeithas Llywodraeth Leol Cymru ac ymarferwyr eraill.

Fel y gŵyr Aelodau, mae polisi Llywodraeth y Cynulliad yn seiliedig ar dair prif thema—cynaliadwyedd, cydraddoldeb a mynd i'r afael ag anfantais gymdeithasol. Mae pob un o'r themâu hyn yn sail i'r gwaith o ddatblygu'r strategaeth—rhaid i dai fod yn gynaliadwy neu gallai pobl ddod yn ddigartref, bydd mynediad teg i dai a

homelessness, and tackling homelessness addresses one of the main aspects of social disadvantage.

Quite simply, the strategy sets out the Assembly Government's objectives and indicates how we might achieve them. I am concerned to ensure that the strategy is implemented as effectively as possible, although much will depend upon the efforts of local organisations. The homelessness strategies working group will continue to scrutinise the development and implementation of the strategy closely, and regular progress reports will be provided to the Local Government and Housing Committee.

You will notice that the final version of the strategy has an action plan, which lists the Assembly Government's commitments and sets out what actions we will take towards meeting them, and by when. That action plan will be constantly reviewed and it covers up to 18 months.

As to the amendments, I reject amendment 1. The Assembly Government seeks endorsement for the national strategy to demonstrate cross-party support. I reject amendment 2, as I do not have responsibility for most of the organisations, but officials will be working with those organisations to support its implementation. I also reject amendment 3. The Assembly Government has undertaken several measures to tackle rural homelessness, such as support for low-cost home ownership, and funding rural initiatives. The strategy recognises the particular issues around rural homelessness and commits the Assembly Government to supporting the development of good practice in providing access to services in those areas.

On amendment 4, the Homelessness Commission debated homelessness targets. It advised the Assembly Government that those targets should only be adopted after the necessary information becomes available in 2003-04. That approach is clearly reflected in

I reject amendment 5. The UK Government has issued a White Paper and a Bill that contains a range of measures to tackle anti-social behaviour. The Assembly Government supports those proposals.

I therefore commend the strategy to Members and I trust that we will have a good discussion on this important issue.

William Graham: I propose the following amendments in the name of Jonathan Morgan. Amendment 1: delete '*resolves to adopt*' and replace with '*acknowledges*'.

I propose amendment 3: add a new point at the end of the motion:

notes that it fails to describe or implement adequate proposals to tackle homelessness in rural areas.

I propose amendment 4: add a new point at the end of the motion:

notes that while the strategy refers to targets outlined in 'Better Wales' and 'Better Homes for the People of Wales', it fails to acknowledge that those targets that will impact on homelessness will not be achieved.

I propose amendment 5: add a new point at the end of the motion:

notes that while the strategy refers to the increasing incidence of evictions in recent years, it fails to direct policies to combat anti-social behaviour and enhance the local environment to allow local authorities to become more efficient in administrating their housing stock.

I will comment on matters raised by the Minister. The Homelessness Commission made some 91 recommendations. We welcome the fact that a large majority of those are incorporated in the strategy. There has been a large measure of cross-party support on this important issue. We acknowledge that the Welsh Assembly Government has made great strides in making

We reiterate our remarks about the independent sector, and I support comments made in the previous debate regarding landlords who do not meet the required standard. We fully support licensing houses in multiple occupation. We regret that some local authorities have yet to implement adequate and rigorous inspection of such properties.

We commend the Minister's work on the low-cost homes strategy, but we regret that more was not done sooner, bearing in mind that there were existing provisions in some of the previous local government Acts.

Will the Minister monitor the results of those targets, which will come out this year and next? We regret that that has been delayed yet again. Admittedly, that was discussed in Committee, but I would have much preferred to have seen those targets implemented at an earlier stage so that we could see what was being done.

I pay tribute to the Deputy Minister for Local Government, who has done a great deal of work to make people aware of this issue, which for many years has lain in the background—

Peter Law: Thanks to the Tories.

William Graham: That remark was predictable. Vast sums of money were made available for local authority housing by successive Conservative Governments. No other party has built so many council houses throughout the United Kingdom.

I am afraid that the Minister does not think that we need to work closely with others to

No-one can claim that we do not need a homelessness strategy. It is upsetting to think that, at the beginning of the twenty-first century, there are still at least 50,000 people in Wales who experience homelessness. Few would disagree that we desperately need this strategy. However a strategy on paper needs to become reality. This body cannot make it a reality on its own. Only by working with partners in local government, housing associations and bodies like Shelter, can we make it a reality.

Although the Minister said that the action plan will be a rolling programme that will change, will she consider introducing performance indicators? When local authorities draw up their homelessness strategies, how will we know whether they are working on them? Authorities may draw up these strategies, but there are concerns about how effectively they will implement them. At some point, will the Minister consider reviewing the strategies and measure to what extent they have been developed?

On the Tories' amendments 1, 3, 4, 5, I am pleased that they now acknowledge the existence of rural homelessness. I recently attended meetings with some of their candidates in the forthcoming election who denied the existence of homelessness and stated that they had never seen anyone sleeping on the streets. I hope that the Tories here will inform their candidates that homelessness exists in rural areas. Young people in rural areas need somewhere to sleep as much as young people in urban areas. To return to what we said in the previous debate, given that so many social housing units have been sold and have not been replaced, it is difficult for local authorities to house homeless people.

Ynghylch gwelliannau'r Torïaid 1, 3, 4, 5, yr wyf yn falch eu bod bellach yn cydnabod bodolaeth digartrefedd gwledig. Bûm mewn cyfarfodydd yn ddiweddar â rhai o'u hymgeiswyr yn yr etholiad sydd i ddod a wadai fod digartrefedd yn bod gan ddatgan na welsant neb erioed yn cysgu ar y stryd. combat anti-social behaviour, we all want to tackle that in our housing estates, but will this homelessness strategy tighten up tenancy regulations, which often lead to homelessness? Will it support and develop counselling and debt advice services? Will it develop credit unions and programmes such as Home Start to support desperate families when they get into trouble and to prevent them from slipping into homelessness?

It is difficult to identify the high number of homeless people who are the hidden homeless. For example, those young people who are not registered as being homeless but who often sleep on friends' floors or sofas. It is one matter to implement a strategy that deals with homelessness that presents itself and another to encourage the full identification of homelessness. However, we cannot get away from the fact that we desperately need a homelessness strategy and that the challenge is huge. A quarter of a million people in Wales live in unfit and potentially dangerous properties. Thousands of people are in mortgage arrears and 100,000 are on a six-month let. Half of the children in Wales are living on low incomes and a third live below the poverty line. The average life expectancy for those who live in decent homes is 79; for the homeless, it is 47. Those statistics speak for themselves. No-one doubts that we need a good homelessness strategy, but it must become a reality. I am glad that the Minister has made a commitment today to looking at the needs, as local authorities identify them, because we have to start putting our budgets where our strategies are.

Peter Law: I regret that amendments have been tabled to this motion. This is a serious matter on which we should be united. We should not play party politics with this. We should look back to when we were voted into office in 1999 and we should certainly look back to 1997 when we would hear the Conservative echo of 'What homelessness?' They never looked behind Marks and Spencer or noticed people sleeping rough in doorways.

The Minister increased that to £4.7 million in four years, which reflects positively how the Government is working to tackle this serious form of social exclusion. It is the worst type of social exclusion. It is all very well for us to pontificate about it, but many of us have never experienced it. However, you can always find out more, and I recommend that you go down the road to the Huggett centre, the Salvation Army hostel, or visit some of the night shelters in your areas, whether they be in Swansea, Cardiff, Rhyl, or Wrexham. I have visited such shelters and the people who run them do a marvellous job; we owe them a great debt of gratitude. They are there for our homeless people when they need help. This strategy is right because, to my knowledge, it is the first to tackle this important subject. It transcends all boundaries. People have said that it does not cover rural areas—it does on page 23, so I do not know where that idea came from. Does where you are make any difference? Homelessness is homelessness. That is the principle behind this document. If you are homeless, you need help, and that is why I support the strategy, and I commend the Minister and the Government for bringing it forward.

I record my thanks to all those who worked on the Homeless Commission—they did a great job. I must even mention Peter Black. I must recognise these efforts today. He will not find tomorrow morning's meeting of the Local Government and Housing Committee so easy. The fact is, however, that everyone on that Committee did a good job, because they worked in partnership. One of the keystones of the document is working in partnership for the good of people who need help, and that must be the way forward. This is not only one person's problem or crisis—everyone has a duty to help these people. Our homeless people require what this strategy promotes, which is the opportunity to ensure the greatest possible provision of accommodation with warmth, safety and care. It is right to support this strategy and

there is no need for division, because this policy is groundbreaking and is important in the provision of social justice for people who suffer the worst type of social exclusion. I commend it.

Geraint Davies: I have several concerns about homelessness. First, there is a need to prevent people from becoming homeless. We must provide appropriate and adequate support to tenants and vulnerable people and help them to acquire debt management and other essential life skills. There is an example of good practice in my constituency. Rhondda housing association, with Assembly funding, offers 120 hours of professional support to tenants every week to equip them with such skills, to help them to avoid debt or facing the threat of evictions or restraint of goods by bailiffs.

Secondly, will the Minister enlighten us as to the current provision for former members of the armed forces? I have come across an example of a voluntary sector plan to establish an eight-bed centre specifically to address the needs of homeless ex-service people, but the local authority has said that there is no need for it. In light of the fact that the Assembly has granted ex-service people priority status, will the Minister tell us whether she agrees that no such need exists?

Thirdly, on opportunities for education and training for homeless people, the strategy states that

‘The Assembly Government will assist ELWa in researching gaps in provision of training in basic pre-vocational and employment skills, which is appropriate to homeless people.’

I welcome this commitment, but I want to know more about the present situation. Will the Minister give details of any current training and education provision for the homeless?

Finally, I have concerns about the treatment of prisoners leaving remand. They have also been allocated priority needs status by the Assembly. Will the Minister clarify with

whom the responsibility lies to provide accommodation for these newly released prisoners? Is it the responsibility of the individual's home authority—the place of residence prior to entering prison—or of the local authority in which the prison is situated? If it is the latter, does the Minister recognise the increased financial burdens placed on those local authorities with prisons? What funding measures has this Government taken to ensure that these local authorities are able to fulfil their responsibilities adequately?

The real test of the Assembly's commitment to tackling homelessness will come in the autumn, when each local authority will prepare its own strategy on homelessness. Only then will we know what gaps in service provision exist, what changes are needed and, crucially, what funding is required. To tackle homelessness, we need a commitment, from whatever government is in power, to fund those strategies to the full.

Dafydd Wigley: Yr wyf yn siarad am y tro olaf, mae'n debyg, yn y Cynulliad hwn, ac mae'r pwnc hwn yn agos at fy nghalon. Yr oedd yn fy mhoeni pan wnes fy arraith gyntaf yn Nhŷ'r Cyffredin bron i 30 mlynedd yn ôl. Mae digartrefedd yn parhau yn broblem yn yr ardaloedd diwydiannol a dinesig, ac yn yr ardaloedd gwledig. Mae natur y broblem weithiau yn amrwyio o ardal i ardal, ac mae'r atebion posibl hefyd yn amrywio. Fodd bynnag, mae'r argyfwng i'r unigolyn yr un mor ddwys.

Rhoddaf sylw arbennig i'r sefyllfa yn yr ardaloedd gwledig, ond cydnabyddaf y broblem aruthrol—a phroblem fwy o ran nifer—sy'n bodoli yn yr ardaloedd trefol ac yn ein Cymoedd. Dafydd Wigley: I speak for probably the last time in this Assembly, and this subject is close to my heart. It concerned me when I made my maiden speech in the House of Commons almost 30 years ago. Homelessness remains a problem in the industrial and urban areas, and in rural areas. The nature of the problem can vary from area to area, and the possible solutions also vary. However, the crisis for the individual is just as serious.

I will pay special attention to the situation in the rural areas, but I acknowledge the huge problem—and the greater problem in terms of numbers—which exists in the urban areas and in our Valleys. However, there are also great problems in rural areas, as the Minister acknowledged. In many areas, it is impossible for young people on an average income to buy houses. The houses are priced beyond their reach. Although the homebuy scheme, which the Government introduced, has helped in some areas, there are other areas where that scheme cannot make much

Wrth gloi, diolchaf i'm cyd-Aelodau, o bob plaid, am eu caredigrwydd a'u cydweithrediad dros y pedair blynedd diwethaf. The Deputy Minister for Local Government (Peter Black): Tackling homelessness is not just about bricks and

of an impression because the cost of the houses is above the threshold.

We therefore need to provide houses to buy or to rent in those areas. It is possible that a change to planning regulations is needed to allow the development of a system already in place in the Peak District in England, namely a local housing market, with lower prices, which makes it possible for people to live in their locality.

I will refer to one other problem, following Geraint Davies's excellent comments. The fate of another group of people concerns me, namely those unfortunate people who are involved with drugs. Often, they lose their home for understandable reasons. Sometimes, they sell everything in their homes, and become homeless as a result. The problem worsens and the downward spiral continues. There was an excellent programme on S4C a few months ago about homelessness in Caernarfon. It was acknowledged in a British forum because of the way it drew attention to homelessness among those who are involved in drugs, even in towns such as Caernarfon and Bangor. As a civilised society, we must address this problem. I hope that we will build upon this strategy, and provide the resources necessary if we are to solve these problems.

To conclude, I thank my colleagues, from all parties, for their kindness and co-operation over the past four years. It has been an honour to be part of the first elected national Welsh body for centuries. In saying farewell to the Assembly, I wish the new Assembly Members well next month. I very much hope that they will want, as I do, to see the Assembly become a real Parliament, with legislative powers and a voice for Wales within the European Union. Work begun is half done, and we can claim that we have, over the past four years, at least begun to face the huge challenge of establishing a Welsh democratic system, which will result in a better future for our nation.

mortar. One or two contributors have missed that essential truth. It is about the level of support to those who have been rehoused; it is about affordable rented housing, coupled with help with day-to-day living and substance misuse—as Dafydd Wigley outlined—and other problems. The Conservative Government sold off cheap housing and failed to recognise that homelessness existed in Wales. It underfunded services and abolished the duty of local councils to rehouse certain groups of people. The local homelessness strategy, and the Welsh Assembly Government's work over the last year or so, has started to put that right and demonstrates that local homelessness strategies are the best way to tackle homelessness. Local councils know the problems and what must be done to tackle them. It is easy to set targets, but they are pointless if they will not be achieved. The right support and accommodation must be in place, and the problems must be understood. That must be done locally, but once it is in place, targets can be set. Until we have support and accommodation—specialist accommodation in some instances—and resources in place, according to local need, then to set targets would be a meaningless exercise. We owe it to homeless people not to enter into meaningless exercises, but to deal with the problems meaningfully. Plaid Cymru discussed targets and ensuring that they are fully implemented, and its amendment proposes that we should, effectively, tell councils that they must deal with the problem. I am sure that local councils around Wales understand that there is a problem, and they are dealing with it. They are willing to work with the Welsh Assembly Government to put it right. Prescription is not the answer. We cannot, as the Welsh Assembly Government, tell local councillors what to do. It is the same old story: we should not be trying to prescribe how councils should go about their business, as Plaid implies in its amendment.

The Welsh Assembly Government has an excellent record in dealing with homelessness in urban and rural areas. We have increased funding sevenfold since 1999 and have

Despite the catalogue of woe that we heard from Janet Ryder, the Government has put its money where its strategy is and takes this issue seriously. Plaid is offering us woe and no solutions; the Government is offering action, resources and help. If I were homeless, I know which I would prefer.

Yr oedd y neuadd yn llawn, gyda chynrychiolwyr o lawer o ranbarthau Ewrop yno. Mae'n amlwg eu bod wedi clywed am ein rhwymedigaeth i ddatblygu cynaliadwy. Mae'r un neges wedi dod o Johannesburg. Phil Williams: I propose the following amendments in the name of Jocelyn Davies. Amendment 1: delete ‘welcomes’ and replace with ‘notes’.

I propose amendment 3. Delete all after ‘19 March 2003’ and replace with:

- regrets the failure of the Government to*
- a) produce the final report in time for debate by the Assembly; and*
 - b) to meet its own deadlines identified in the action plan.*

A month ago, I attended a seminar in Brussels on sustainable development organised by the Wales European Centre. I will start with the good news. The hall was packed, with representatives from many European regions present. It is clear that they had heard of our commitment to sustainable development. The same message has come from Johannesburg. It is important to acknowledge the number of people throughout the world who regard Wales as a leader in this field. A great responsibility rests on our shoulders. The question is: is Wales succeeding as a leader? The Government's objectives are admirable, but is it achieving those objectives quickly enough? That is why this report is important.

The most important issue for me, of course, is global warming. How much of an improvement have we achieved since 1999? According to the report, carbon dioxide emissions continued to increase sharply after 1999, but, unfortunately, there are no figures after 2000. A month ago, I warmly welcomed the announcement that the Government supports a target of ensuring 4 TWh a year from alternative energy sources by 2010. That is excellent. However, according to the report the percentage of electricity from

Unwaith yn rhagor, mae amcanion Cymru Ar-lein yn ardderchog, ond dros y pedair blynedd diwethaf, mae'r bwlc rhwng Cymru a Lloegr o ran mynediad i fand eang wedi tyfu. Yn dechnegol, peth syml yw rhoi mynediad band eang i 80 y cant o bobl Cymru erbyn 2004. Mae digon o arian i wneud y gwaith; mae £28 miliwn ar gael mewn grantiau Amcan 1 i ddatblygu isadeilledd technoleg gwybodaeth. Fodd bynnag, hyd yn hyn, ni wariwyd ceiniog ohono. Dyna wir fesur o flaenoriaethau'r Llywodraeth. Nid oes teimlad o frys ynglŷn â phynciau hollbwysig datblygu cynaliadawy.

I grynhoi, mae pob Aelod yn falch o'r egwyddor datblygu cynaliadwy a geir yn Neddf Llywodraeth Cymru 1998, ac yr ydym i gyd yn cefnogi amcanion y Llywodraeth, ond bu ei pherfformiad dros bedair blynedd gyntaf y Cynulliad yn siomedig. Fel y dywedodd yr hen sant, 'Dduw, gwna fi'n bur, ond nid eto.'

The Deputy Presiding Officer: In the absence of the Conservatives, does anybody else wish to propose amendment 4? I see that nobody does, and, therefore, we shall move on.

Eleanor Burnham: I bow to the intellectual superiority of Professor Phil Williams. I do not know now whether I should say that I believe that Wales is developing a strong, international sustainable development role. I intended to say so, and have done so now, but

sustainable sources fell between 1999 and 2001. Wales is still waiting for technical advice note 8 to give guidance on developing alternative energy.

Information technology is another matter that is important to me. One session in Brussels concentrated on IT as an essential part of sustainable development, and, last week, the TeleRegions Network debated the same subject. Through IT, it is possible to reduce traffic and also to ensure the future of rural villages. That is environmental, social and economic sustainability.

Once again, Cymru Ar-lein's objectives are excellent, but over the last four years, the gap between England and Wales in terms of access to broadband has widened. Technically, providing broadband access to 80 per cent of the people of Wales by 2004 is simple. There is enough money to do the work; £28 million is available in Objective 1 grants to develop information technology infrastructure. However, to date, not a penny of that money has been spent. That is the true measure of the Government's priorities. There is no sense of urgency on vital sustainable development issues.

In summary, every Member is proud of the sustainable development principle in the Government of Wales Act 1998, and we all support the Government's objectives, but its performance over the first four years of the Assembly has been disappointing. As the saint said, 'God make me pure, but not yet.'

Therefore, I cannot warmly welcome this report. I hope that the new Government, after 1 May, will do better.

Y Dirprwy Lywydd: Yn absenoldeb y Ceidwadwyr, a oes rhywun arall sy'n dymuno cynnig gwelliant 4? Gwelaf nad oes neb ac, felly, symudwn ymlaen.

Eleanor Burnham: Ymostyngaf i ragoriaeth ddeallusol yr Athro Phil Williams. Ni wn yn awr a ddylwn ddweud fy mod yn credu bod Cymru'n datblygu rôl gryf a rhyngwladol mewn datblygu cynaliadwy. Bwriadswrn ddweud hynny, ac yr wyf wedi gwneud

who knows. I believe that we are at the forefront, posing key questions, and are in a relatively strong position to access the new global best practice to which Phil alluded, and thus able to keep Wales at the cutting edge of sustainable development.

We must not be complacent, and I hope that the Minister agrees that we should diligently support sustainable development and should not have a penny-pinching approach to it. It is not a one-off event; it is an evolving cultural change. The Assembly's sustainable development scheme was developed two and a half years ago and some appropriate internal and external strategies and structures are now being established. Internally, we have the Cabinet sub-committee, and the Assembly's sustainable development co-ordinating group, which includes Chairs of Subject Committees and all-party spokespersons. However, we must meet and beef-up what we have been trying to do. I commend the external establishment of an independent sustainable development forum for Wales, which, hopefully, will help to map the path towards sustainable development and become a catalyst for change in all sectors of society in Wales.

I also welcome the establishment of Wales Social Partners Unit Ltd to aid consultation, the integration tool, which is an innovative development for use in designing policies, the spatial plan and the ecological footprint. Such developments are a sound beginning. Cultural change requires long-term development, and I hope that the Assembly will continue, on its return in May, to beef-up all sustainable development policies.

The Minister for Environment (Sue Essex): It is interesting to see that we have a Tory-free Chamber at the moment—[ASSEMBLY MEMBERS: ‘Oh.’] Perhaps that will be sustained in future. It shows the level of interest that the Conservatives have in sustainable development; we should all remember that.

Last week, I introduced the report and outlined the approach that we have been

I am proud that employment in Wales is rising. That makes us more sustainable in terms of economic, social and environmental progress, not less.

As for the criticism that progress is not fast enough, that misses the point completely. We are learning to do something new. We are trying to put sustainable development at the heart of Government. We do not have models or templates from elsewhere that we merely have to implement. We are moving forward step by step, doing whatever we can, whenever we can, within our powers and resources. We do not get everything 100 per cent right the first time, all the time. I always make that clear.

Rhodri Glyn Thomas: I accept what you are saying, Minister. I said in my speech last week that I know that you as a Minister are committed to sustainable development and I know what you are trying to achieve. However, sustainable development in Wales must be holistic and cross-cutting in order to work. The danger at the moment is that we have individual schemes, rather than an overall, holistic and cross-cutting approach to sustainable development.

Sue Essex: I understand that, but the situation has changed. What you say is based on old information. Consider what Eleanor mentioned: the appraisal tours, the Cabinet sub-committee and so on. When previously would NHS Estates, with Jane Hutt, have come before that sub-committee to consider

how it can respond to sustainable development? When previously would we have had a business and environment report such as that Andrew Davies has produced recently? We are getting there. The worst that we could do in Wales is to put our heads down and say that we are not moving fast enough and not doing enough. We must proceed step by step—I believe that passionately. We cannot solve matters overnight. This requires a great change in thinking and in culture. It would be entirely wrong to think that we could just snap our fingers and make those important changes at once.

Christine Chapman: You mentioned the cross-cutting nature of sustainable development. Do you also welcome the fact that the Objective 1 programme monitoring committee requested a progress report on sustainable development at its last meeting? We had an excellent discussion in that meeting—Phil Williams will remember it. Much needs to be done, as you said. Sustainable development is new for Wales, but we recognise the progress that has been made in Objective 1 schemes. There are many examples of good practice out there. However, we cannot be complacent; the programme monitoring committee certainly is not, and we want to see more progress.

Sue Essex: That is exactly right. We are making progress, monitoring what we are doing and making adjustments where we can. If we can do that by means of Objective 1 schemes—which are essentially about economic development—and have an understanding at the grass-roots level of decision-making, then I am positive and optimistic about the outcomes.

Eleanor Burnham: It seems to me that it is up to the Assembly to encourage local authorities, such as the one featured in the media a few weeks ago—I think that it was Gwynedd Council—which has decided to use Spanish slate on the roofs of the buildings that it is in charge of. Surely we should be considering the sustainable development of slate quarries in north Wales?

Sue Essex: Local government is key in

However, we are carefully considering local procurement, because sourcing materials locally makes sense in terms of transport and its impact on the environment.

Whatever we do—and I say this to Rhodri Glyn—we must take people with us. This is not about dictating from the top. It is about showing leadership, not dictating from the top. Sustainable development means combining a strategic overview with people's everyday concerns. Like Phil Williams, I have been in politics for a long time and I have learned that you must take people with you. We are not in an age when we can impose matters on people. We must get them to understand the situation and commit to those decisions in their hearts and minds. We must proceed step by step to change the culture—we must accept that that will be the case in Wales. Over the last three and a half years—almost four years—we have come an enormously long way.

I will give way to Brian. Do not tell me; you are going to talk about canals, Brian.

Brian Hancock: No. What you say is important. To make sustainable development work, we need a sustainable economy. You know my feelings about the three-legged stool. It has the legs of the economy, education, and the environment. However, we must ensure that business and the environment work together—[*Interruption.*] Actually, the three-legged stool stays quite stable as long as you keep it together and do not lose your head as some people do—and their seats, probably. The important point is that business and the environment must work together. We must also, somehow pump-prime industry to think in terms of sustainable development and the way it uses materials in the future. Two examples of that would be recycled paper and—

Sue Essex: I have quoted ad nauseam examples of where business and the needs of the environment have come together dramatically in Wales. There are examples at the strategic level, in the work that Andrew Davies has done, and that the Welsh Development Agency is now doing. The ARENA Network and the Green Dragon awards have been enormously successful in Wales. Small and medium-sized enterprises are being established as a result, particularly in the waste sector. The challenge posed by waste is being used to provide job opportunities. We are getting that right. What you mention is in place, Brian. I champion that at every possible opportunity. This is about integrated government. The Assembly Cabinet has taken sustainable development to heart and is working it through.

It is not just about big, headline-grabbing schemes and trampling on people's legitimate concerns. If the public does not recognise that there are hard choices to be made—it will be difficult at times, and people's rights must be respected—they do not understand sustainable development. This is about the social dimension, education, and working with people in the real world. 'Get real' is the appropriate phrase, because there are no magic wands. It is a matter of setting a direction, working your way through, admitting mistakes when you make them, but also celebrating your successes. It is important to celebrate successes.

Phil Williams is committed to the development of renewable energy and a reduction in greenhouse gas emissions. I share his sense of urgency. However, sustainability is about thinking in the long term. It is about putting the proper foundations of decision-making in place and putting the capacity in now. I make no apologies about the fact that technical advice note 8 is taking time to produce. It is a groundbreaking piece of work. There is only one other place in the world doing this work as we are doing it in Wales, I believe. Once

we have that policy base in place, it will make decision-making much easier. It will send out strong messages to the industry on renewable energy. That is the base from which Wales can expand in the way that we want it to do.

There are many examples of progress; I will not take up Members' time by listing them all. They include the Tir Gofal scheme, for which a large number of people are signing up—the list is open today—and a huge number of people are already taking part in it. We are also looking at how health trusts are working, and how we develop social housing. Excellent, innovative work is being done in the Assembly. We also have public transport initiatives, such as that on demand-responsive transport that I opened the week before last with Tom Middlehurst in Flintshire, which puts transport at the heart of people's lives. We have a good success story to tell.

Finally, who would have thought a few years ago, Phil, that you would be in Brussels—I was not there, but would have dearly loved to have been—in a packed room celebrating what we have done, and sharing the way that we will go forward? Who would have thought that our First Minister, Rhodri Morgan, would be at San Sebastian following the Gauteng declaration, talking to regions from across the world, from developed and undeveloped countries, about our experiences of learning together? This is about learning to live differently and to live together. We can celebrate that.

I consider the reports to be exceptionally important work on behalf of our Subject Committees. I also thank the secretariat for its invaluable contribution in terms of bringing all the evidence together and presenting it in a report that, I hope, will be valuable in terms of policy-making in the Assembly following the election on 1 May. I thank the individuals and organisations that submitted evidence to us during this review.

In terms of the report's key themes, it is clear that participation in sport and physical exercise would be beneficial to the health of the public in Wales. It would be a way of avoiding many diseases suffered by members of the public in Wales. Physical exercise assists in reducing the risk of heart disease, obesity, some types of cancers, type 2 diabetes, injuries linked to the ageing process and mental health problems. We are not only talking about sport but also about doing 30 minutes of moderate physical exercise, such as walking, five times per week. That is the recommended level that will benefit people's health. We also encourage the process of educating people at a young age to exercise because it will mean that they will continue to do so throughout their lives.

Sport and physical exercise can be beneficial to our communities. There is evidence that it can reduce crime and anti-social behaviour, and it enables people to be part of society, thereby increasing social inclusion.

During this review, the Committee found that participation rates in sport and physical exercise were lower in Wales than in the rest of the United Kingdom and many other

O ran pobl ifanc, yr oedd diffygion yn y cwricwlwm o ran cyflwyno'r cyfle i wneud gwahanol fathau o chwaraeon ac ymarfer corff; yr oedd diffyg amrywiaeth yn y chwaraeon a gynigir yn ein hysgolion; a diffyg cyfle a chymorth i'r sawl nad oedd yn serennu ym maes chwaraeon. Yr oedd popeth yn iawn i'r sawl a oedd yn cyrraedd y tîm cyntaf, ond i'r sawl nad oedd yn cyrraedd y lefel honno, cyfyngedig oedd y cyfleoedd.

O ran pobl ag anabledd, gwelwyd diffyg trafnidiaeth gyhoeddus i'w cludo i gyfleusterau lleol. Prin oedd y staff mewn canolfannau a hyfforddwyd yn briodol i'w cynorthwyo, ac nid oedd ganddynt wybodaeth gyffredinol am y cyfleusterau ar gael.

Yr oedd diffyg croeso i bobl o leiafrifoedd ethnig, a diffyg hyfforddiant i staff ar sut i ddelio â'u gofynion. Hefyd, o ran pobl hŷn, gwelwyd diffygion cyfle a diffygion hysbysebu'r cyfleusterau a oedd ar gael.

I grwpiau yn dioddef o amddifadedd cymdeithasol, yr oedd cost yn broblem, nid oedd anogaeth iddynt, a theimlent nad oedd croeso iddynt mewn rhai canolfannau a chlybiau.

countries. We also realised that they were lower among women than men, among certain ethnic minority and socially disadvantaged groups, and that they decreased with age. We discovered a shortage of facilities and personnel, and noted specific deficiencies in terms of volunteers and facilities, such as providing buses to take people to leisure centres. We saw that there was a problem in terms of entrance fees to facilities, and that there were difficulties in terms of promoting them. There were also time constraints.

On women's participation in sport, we noted a lack of support within the family environment, there were time constraints, and women were concerned about their personal safety in sports centres.

In terms of young people, the curriculum had shortcomings in providing opportunities to take part in different types of sport and physical education; there was a lack of variety in the sports taught in our schools; and a lack of opportunity and support to those who did not excel in sports. If a pupil was selected for the first team, everything was fine, but for those who did not reach that level, the opportunities were limited.

With regard to disabled people, there was insufficient public transport to take people to local facilities. There was a shortage of appropriately trained staff to assist them, and there was a lack of awareness of the facilities available.

People from ethnic minorities felt unwelcome, and staff were not trained on how to deal with their needs. Also, in terms of older people, there was a lack of opportunity and inadequate promotion of the available facilities.

Cost was a problem for socially disadvantaged groups; there was no encouragement for them and they did not feel welcome in some centres and clubs.

The report's recommendations in general are that the Committee wants to see a broader

Alison Halford: Thank you, Rhodri Glyn, for leading the Culture Committee so well. The Committee's report goes a long way towards outlining the barriers to participation in sport in Wales, and will make the Minister's work on her sports strategy that

focus on physical exercise; more links with areas that overlap with sport, such as health, education and local government; more collaboration with local authorities to improve the standards of, and access to, facilities; and wants the Minister to produce an action plan to increase the number of volunteers and voluntary activities. We want her to consider the Sports Council for Wales's proposals for coaching, and consider including the development of a coaching strategy in the main strategy for sport.

The Sports Council for Wales should work with local authorities and women's associations to ensure that there is information about the structures and facilities available. We call for consideration of the benefits to public health, and call on the Sports Council for Wales to work with the Equal Opportunities Commission, local authorities and sports associations to develop an action plan to ensure that barriers to access to physical exercise and sport for people from minority communities be abolished.

We feel, after nearly a year of studying this subject, that there are many areas where we could ensure that facilities are available more often, and that there is more opportunity for people to participate. We hope that the Minister, as she prepares her sports strategy, takes note of this Committee's main recommendations.

Once again, I thank everyone who contributed to this process. I especially thank Marie Knox and her team in the Committee Secretariat, for their excellent work in preparing this report. We hope that the report will be warmly received by the National Assembly for Wales, and that the Minister responsible for culture after the election on 1 May will use its findings when developing policies.

Alison Halford: Diolch i chi, Rhodri Glyn, am arwain y Pwyllgor Diwylliant mor dda. Mae adroddiad y Pwyllgor yn cyfrannu'n helaeth at amlinellu'r rhwystrau rhag cymryd rhan mewn chwaraeon yng Nghymru, a bydd yn hwyluso rywfaint ar waith y Gweinidog ar

much easier. As Jane Hutt's healthy and active lifestyles taskforce reported, and as Rhodri Glyn mentioned, some 50 per cent of adults in Wales are overweight—I confess that I am among that unhappy band, and the situation is getting worse—and 17 per cent are obese. There is, therefore, a strong need for a sports strategy in Wales.

Increasing participation in sport by women and by my favourite set of people, older people, is one of my key concerns. Women's sport is influenced by a myriad of different issues. However, the barriers to participation are clear. Media images of sport that portray gender bias dissuade women from pursuing such sports as rugby, football and cricket. Women want to play these sports. Even women's participation in traditional women's sports, such as netball, is decreased because public provision for netball is far less than for men's sports, forcing women to travel further to reach appropriate facilities, which are often crowded, dirty, ill-equipped and do not meet the demands of modern women. This is why I strongly support the need for leisure centres to have crèches, more private changing facilities and, vitally, a well-lit car park equipped with closed circuit television. During our review, these were three 'hot button' issues and all women felt that these facilities were missing at leisure centres.

I also believe that funding should not be limited to conventional sport. Our key goal is for women to have an active lifestyle by taking part in something that they enjoy. Aerobics has been phenomenally popular over the last few years, and we should support it as a fun and inexpensive way to keep fit.

The need for an active lifestyle does not stop as you get older. Unfortunately, there remains a belief that sport is not appropriate for older people. Fortunately, this report lays that silly belief to rest. Whether you are eight or 80, an active lifestyle is vital. I am sure that the

Government will act on the Committee's support for Finland's 'fit for life' campaign, which saw participation in exercise by people aged between 40 and 60 rocket by almost 50 per cent. Those people's hearts and so on improved as a result.

I pay a warm tribute to all my colleagues on the Committee—it was great fun. I pay particular tribute to the Committee's secretariat, especially the stand-in clerk, Marie Knox, who worked tremendously hard to bring this interesting review to a successful conclusion. We have enjoyed our work on sport. I wish the post-election Committee every success. During this review, we have listened to a whole range of stimulating evidence. We know that there are challenges facing sport in Wales, but this report goes a long way towards ensuring that we get it right.

Owen John Thomas: Dros y pedair blynedd diwethaf, daethom yn gyfarwydd â derbyn adroddiadau ac adolygiadau dros 100 tudalen o hyd. Yr oeddwn yn falch mai dim ond 50 tudalen yw hyd yr adroddiad hwn. Mae'n dwt a chlir, a chroesawaf hynny. Hoffwn weld adroddiadau byrrach, sy'n haws i'w darllen a'u dadansoddi.

Fel y dywedwyd eisoes, tynnir sylw yn yr adroddiad at grwpiau—megis menywod, pobl ifanc, lleiafrifoedd ethnig, pobl anabl a phobl mewn ardaloedd difreintiedig—sy'n cymryd llai o ran mewn chwaraeon na phobl eraill. Owen John Thomas: Over the past four years, we have become accustomed to receiving reports and reviews that are over 100 pages in length. I was pleased that this report is only 50 pages long. It is clear and concise, and I welcome that. I would like to see shorter reports, which are easier to read and analyse.

As has already been said, attention is drawn in the report to groups—such as women, young people, ethnic minorities, disabled people and people in disadvantaged areas—who participate less in sport than do others. Attention is drawn to the fact that a wider choice must be offered in order to attract more people to participate in sport.

However, there are problems that stand in the way of success and progress in this field, and we must remove those barriers. For example, there is a shortage of resources in schools, particularly in primary schools—a shortage of dedicated halls for physical education, a shortage of playing fields in city centre schools, a shortage of staff who are confident in giving PE lessons, a shortage of changing rooms, a lack of time because children must travel by bus to play football and a shortage

of money to hire a playing field every week. All this costs money. It is easy to draw attention to these issues, but it is important for the Culture Committee and the Education and Lifelong Learning Committee to work together to ensure that more funding is made available for schools to create the facilities that are required to deliver sports programmes in every school

There is no statutory requirement that local authorities spend money on sport, which means that they will not fund physical education and leisure activities when they are required to address other needs, such as housing.

One of the main recommendations of the school PE taskforce—which was established nearly three years ago in May 2000—was to make PE a core subject in the school curriculum. Many years have passed since that recommendation was made, but nothing has been done about it. I do not know whether that is another example of the inadequacy of Assembly powers, but it is sad that we have not implemented that recommendation either through a lack of will or through a lack of legislation.

In closing, I turn to the importance of sport to the future of the nation. Many Members have already mentioned the importance of sport in the context of health, but as the review states, sport is a vital part of the fabric of our communities and if more resources were made available for young people to participate in sports during the summer and winter, there would be far less criminal activity. Many reports have shown that to be the case. It is also important that we do this from the bottom up. For example, providing more money for schools would ensure that the pupils would be better at physical activity, and would play rugby to a higher standard.

By creating a joint centre of excellence between the Football Association of Wales and the Welsh Rugby Union, we could provide training pitches and facilities to develop the talents of our under 21 and under 16 national teams. We could then hold our heads up high as Welsh people and be proud

Rosemary Butler: It is clear from reading the report that many good initiatives are in place in Wales. We must ensure that the higher standard is spread across the country. The report highlights the Sports Council for Wales and its work. The sports council is held in high regard across Britain and Elite Cymru is a European model of best practice. The report recognises the huge involvement of local authorities, which we should never forget. We must ensure that facilities are accessible, affordable and, as Alison said, of the highest possible standard. However, although it is a good report, it must be considered to be interim. We only had a short time in which to consider it and, in that space of time, we did a good job. However, we have not received the input of the Health and Social Services Committee and the Education and Lifelong Learning Committee, which is important. We need to apply the example of peripatetic teachers in music—they are the norm. Why cannot that be the case in sport and PE?

Sport and physical activity is truly inclusive. I have always considered sport to be a great leveller. When you see a team playing on a pitch, the players' backgrounds are never known—they could be rich or poor. It is important that we ensure that everyone across Wales has the opportunity to participate in sports. Many Members mentioned cost and investing money. I do not see this as a cost to the nation; it is a true investment in the people. I look forward to seeing the other reports in the Assembly's next session.

Geraint Davies: I congratulate the Committee on this important report. Sport activities and health improvement are important in breaking the chain between poverty, deprivation and ill health. The earlier we start, and the earlier we teach people good health habits, the more likely they are to follow those habits throughout

Cyfeiriodd llawer o Aelodau at gost a buddsoddi arian. Ni welaf fod hyn yn gost i'r genedl; mae'n fuddsoddiad gwirioneddol mewn pobl. Edrychaf ymlaen at weld yr adroddiadau eraill yn sesiwn nesaf y Cynulliad.

Geraint Davies: Llongyfarchaf y Pwyllgor ar yr adroddiad pwysig hwn. Mae gweithgareddau chwaraeon a gwella iechyd yn bwysig o ran torri'r cyswllt rhwng tlodi, amddifadedd ac iechyd gwael. Gorau po gyntaf y dechreawn ac y dysgwyr arferion iechyd da i bobl, gan y byddant yn fwy tebygol wedyn o ddilyn yr arferion hynny

their lifetimes, and the more likely they are to pass them on to other people. I am proud to say that a Rhondda Cynon Taf County Borough Council initiative will offer free use of council sports facilities to children and young people during the forthcoming Easter holidays. The innovative free swimming plus programme will offer a variety of sports activities and swimming for 16-year-olds and under, free of charge at council pools and sports centres. I warmly welcome Rhodri Morgan's announcement of free swimming in 10 local authorities for the Easter holidays, but I am proud to say that Rhondda Cynon Taf has taken its programme a step further. It is unique in Wales, and it offers not only free swimming, but also all other sports activities provided by leisure centres, including team sports, such as basketball, netball and football, which promote a social aspect.

We suffer from high rates of ill health in the Valleys, and we must do all that we can to encourage good exercise and healthy lifestyles for all. What better way is there to do that than by giving all our youngsters the chance to participate in sports activities free of charge? Children enjoying their school holidays, who might ordinarily be unable to take advantage of sports facilities for financial reasons, will now have plenty of time to delight in the free swimming and numerous sporting activities that have been planned.

Glyn Davies: I congratulate the Chair of the Committee on the interesting, and sometimes colourful, way that he has chaired it. He has kept our attention throughout. I apologise that I have not been able to participate as much as I would have liked on this particular item because I have been troubled by a degree of ill health. I am sorry about that because I have always been a sports fanatic, recognising that it can provide a tremendous amount of enjoyment to young people. It has underpinned my social life, and lately, I have understood its contribution to good health in Wales. That is how we must see sport in the future. Personal fitness has been hugely important to me, and it was crucial to my recovery from the operation that I underwent

Glyn Davies: Llongyfarchaf Gadeirydd y Pwyllgor ar ei ddull diddorol, a lliwgar weithiau, o'i gadeirio. Hoeliodd ein sylw drwy gydol yr amser. Ymddiheuraf am na fu modd imi gymryd cymaint o ran ag y dymunaswn yn yr eitem benodol hon gan imi gael fy mlino gan rywfaint o iechyd gwael. just before Christmas. Yesterday, I was particularly proud of myself—I am sometimes proud of myself—for being able to run three miles to help the McMillan nurses launch their colon cancer awareness month in Cardiff, just 12-and-a-half weeks after undergoing fairly major surgery. [Applause.]

Words, of which there are many good ones in this strategy, are not enough—we must translate them into action. I have, on many occasions, raised the issue of having a gym in the National Assembly. It is all very well talking about encouraging people to participate in sport, but it is appalling that a building like this, where so many people have lifestyles that make it difficult for them to participate in sport, does not have a gym.

Lorraine Barrett rose—

Glyn Davies: In a moment. I do not mean a glossy, St David's hotel type gym. I am talking about somewhere where people can go to exercise during the half an hour they manage to find during a busy day.

Lorraine Barrett: Do you therefore look forward to the time when we have a new debating chamber, when this room could be turned into a gym?

Glyn Davies: If the Assembly is unwise enough to go forward with the new building, then this particular room would be useful as a gymnasium.

Eleanor Burnham: Do you not believe that a swimming pool—which we would not expect the people of Wales to pay for—as opposed to a gym, would be better? Swimming pools are far healthier, because people can cause themselves great harm in gyms.

Glyn Davies: I can do no more than say that that was a typical Liberal Democrat intervention. I want to move on, but I will take one more intervention.

Brian Gibbons: Do you agree that there are

Glyn Davies: That was a constructive suggestion from Brian Gibbons, which I heartily endorse.

I want to criticise the Minister. In terms of sport, the Minister's performance has not been all that it should have been. There was an article in *Wales on Sunday* this week, which many of you will have read, which was quite fair, as I do not think that the Minister has given the appropriate priority to sport. If the Conservatives are swept to power on 1 May, and I were lucky enough to become the Minister responsible for sport, I can reassure the people of Wales that sport would be given a much higher priority in the investments and activities of the National Assembly.

There are a few more points where I think that the Minister has failed and I am not only saying these things because there will soon be an election and I want to emphasise the Minister's failings. There can be no doubt that, during her tenure of office, she has not delivered that which she should have. I want to touch on a few examples. One is the share of lottery funding that Wales receives. The Minister agrees with us, but she has not delivered Wales's rightful share. This morning a headmaster who has a good project in his school telephoned me. He told me that new opportunities fund money is not being spent. It is being held up, and again the Minister is not delivering. The earlier Liberal Democrat intervention typified what we often hear from the Minister—much talk of rather silly ideas that are not practical. Delivery is nil and the people of Wales should take the opportunity to ensure that we are not burdened by this sort of Minister in the future.

The Minister for Culture, Sport and the Welsh Language (Jenny Randerson): Despite Glyn's cheap shots I suggest that 'this sort of Minister' probably means that, in his eyes, we should not have a female

Jenny Randerson: No. I am not taking an intervention from you.

Glyn Davies: Then you should not make such stupid comments.

Jenny Randerson: You should not make comments like that.

The Deputy Presiding Officer: Order.

Jenny Randerson: As a Committee, we have worked constructively and effectively together and I thank the Chair and Committee members, for their important work in scoping a fundamentally important task, which will be addressed in the next Assembly. That task is to maximise the contribution that sport, physical activity and active recreation make to wellbeing in Wales across its many dimensions, which are reflected in all ministerial portfolios. The Committee has recognised this reality and has opted for a cross-cutting, integrated approach. Over several months, the Welsh Assembly Government has been working towards a strategic response, and that work is largely completed. While it would be inappropriate for me to consult publicly during the period of purdah, the election period, I am confident that the ground has been prepared for radical thinking and action.

Today, I will discuss some of the basic principles.

Brian Hancock: Minister, you are talking about radical action, and Rosemary mentioned peripatetic assistance. In this radical situation, will you consider supporting the coaches and trainers of various sports so that they can get time off work, if they needed it, to up their skills, to be able to provide those sports throughout Wales?

Glyn Davies *a gododd*—

Jenny Randerson: Na. Ni dderbyniaf ymyriad gennych.

Glyn Davies: Os felly, ni ddylech wneud sylwadau mor dwp.

Jenny Randerson: Ni ddylech wneud sylwadau fel hwnnw.

Y Dirprwy Lywydd: Trefn.

Jenny Randerson: Fel Pwyllgor, yr ydym wedi gweithio'n adeiladol ac yn effeithiol gyda'n gilydd a diolchaf i'r Cadeirydd ac aelodau'r Pwyllgor am eu gwaith pwysig wrth gwmpasu gorchwyl hanfodol bwysig, a gaiff sylw yn y Cynulliad nesaf. Y gorchwyl hwnnw yw amlhau cyfraniad chwaraeon, gweithgaredd corfforol ac adloniant gweithredol i bob agwedd ar les yng Nghymru, a adlewyrchir y mhortffolios yr holl Weinidogion. Mae'r Pwyllgor wedi cydnabod y gwirionedd hwn ac wedi dewis dull gweithredu integredig a thrawsbynciol. Dros sawl mis, bu Llywodraeth Cynulliad Cymru yn gweithio i roi ymateb strategol, ac mae'r gwaith hwnnw wedi'i gwblhau i raddau helaeth. Er y byddai'n amhriodol imi ymgynghori'n gyhoeddus yn ystod y cyfnod o neilltuaeth, cyfnod yr etholiad, yr wyf yn ffyddiog bod y tir wedi'i fraenaru ar gyfer meddwl a gweithredu radical.

Heddiw, trafodaf rai o'r egwyddorion sylfaenol.

Brian Hancock: Weinidog, yr ydych yn sôn am weithredu radical, a chyfeiriodd Rosemary at gymorth gan athrawon teithiol. Yn y sefyllfa radical hon, a wnewch ystyried cynorthwyo hyfforddwyr gwahanol chwaraeon fel y gallant gael amser o'u gwaith, os oes arnynt angen hynny, i wella eu sgiliau, er mwyn gallu darparu'r chwaraeon hynny ledled Cymru?

Jenny Randerson: I am conscious of the need to develop more time and resources for coaches. Halfway through last year I asked the Sports Council for Wales to produce a strategy on coaching, for which I am waiting. I hope that additional money will be available for that—it has been earmarked. The vision for the future is simple—an active, healthy and inclusive world where sports, physical activity and active recreation provide a common platform for endeavour, participation, achievement and fun, which binds communities and the nation. It foresees a world in which sustainable use of the outstanding environment of Wales enhances our confidence in ourselves and our place in the world.

John Griffiths: Will you encourage Members to set a personal example as the Assembly football team did last year when it played against the Houses of Parliament as a precursor to the community shield? Another tournament is planned for this year when the Scottish Parliament and, I hope, the Northern Ireland Assembly will also take part. Will you encourage Assembly Members to participate in such activities, to set personal examples, and to show their commitment in a practical way? Finally, will you encourage us all to canvass and distribute leaflets as energetically as possible, so that if re-elected, we return fitter and more able to play football in August?

Jenny Randerson: I am sure that we will all be much fitter when we return, and I always encourage physical activity. We must be more physically active. The Committee has emphasised health, and the health gains are tremendous. By investing in being more active, we can avoid hundreds of premature deaths each year and improve our quality of life. Building on the existing GP referral schemes is one way to achieve this. We need active citizens to deliver long-term prosperity, which is linked to physical activity as it is to health. Not only do health and fitness form part of any sensible definition of wellbeing, but healthy people are more productive and more confident.

Jenny Randerson: Yr wyf yn ymwybodol o'r angen i ddatblygu mwy o amser ac adnoddau ar gyfer hyfforddwyr. Gobeithiaf y bydd arian ychwanegol ar gael ar gyfer hynny—mae wedi'i glustnodi. Mae'r weledigaeth ar gyfer y dyfodol yn un syml—byd gweithgar, iach a chynhwysol lle y mae chwaraeon, gweithgaredd corfforol ac adloniant gweithredol yn cynnig llwyfan cyffredin ar gyfer ymdrechu, cyfranogi, cyflawni a hwyl, sy'n asio cymunedau a'r genedl. Rhagwelir byd lle y bydd defnydd cynaliadwy o amgylchedd eithriadol Cymru'n atgyfnerthu hyder ynom ni'n hunain a'n lle yn y byd.

John Griffiths: A wnewch annog Aelodau i osod esiampl bersonol fel y gwnaeth tîm pêl-droed y Cynlliad y llynedd pan chwaraeodd yn erbyn y Senedd cyn ymgiprys am darian y gymuned? Bwriedir cynnal twrnamaint arall eleni pan fydd Senedd yr Alban ac, yr wyf yn gobeithio, Cynlliad Gogledd Iwerddon yn cymryd rhan hefyd. A wnewch annog Aelodau o'r Cynlliad i gymryd rhan mewn gweithgareddau o'r fath, i osod esiampl bersonol, ac i ddangos eu hymrwymiad yn ymarferol? Jenny Randerson: Yr wyf yn sicr y byddwn oll yn fwy heini pan ddychwelwn, ac yr wyf bob amser yn cymell gweithgaredd corfforol. Rhaid inni fod yn fwy heini. Mae'r Pwyllgor wedi rhoi pwys ar iechyd, ac mae'r cynnydd mewn iechyd yn aruthrol. Drwy fuddsoddi i fod yn fwy gweithgar, gallwn osgoi cannoedd o farwolaethau cynamserol bob blwyddyn a gwella ansawdd ein bywyd. Datblygu'r cynlluniau atgyfeirio presennol sydd gan feddygon teulu yw un modd i gyflawni hynny. From the economic studies that underpin the Department for Culture, Media and Sport's report, 'Game Plan', we know that a 10 per cent improvement in levels of physical activity among Welsh adults would—as a conservative estimate—contribute more than £100 million to the Welsh economy every year. Over time, I want to see dynamic sports and leisure industries contributing thousands of additional jobs to the Welsh economy. Free access to swimming facilities in leisure centres this Easter and throughout Wales in the summer is a start. I want to ensure that we provide young people with a much wider level of free entry to sports facilities. Wales needs to maximise the synergy between sport, physical activity and the environment in a sustainable way. [Interruption.] I cannot take any more interventions. Mountain bike ranges are making a new and exciting contribution. Let us have more of them. Wales needs its people to be more sports-literate to acquire the best generic set of sports skills, the necessary physical toolkit and qualifications for children and young people. We need more active communities, and those are most desperately required in the areas of greatest social exclusion and deprivation.

Eleanor Burnham rose—

Jenny Randerson: I am sorry. I cannot take any more interventions. Sport can make such a difference. The free swimming initiative, first piloted in Glasgow, had much more effect in the most deprived community.

We need more systematic and sustainable success in the sports that matter most to us. We are a small country, but we need to think big. We need to consider the impact that Mark Hughes and the Wales football team has on the morale of our country. We need to look at the effect that Colin Jackson's sustained success has had on us. We need not accept peripheral status. We are a small

Rosemary mentioned the importance of local authorities. We will need to consider the future structure of sport in Wales. The recent quinquennial review confirmed the need for a sports council, but levelled serious challenges at that sports council. Some fundamental issues and questions have to be addressed about the way it operates. It must operate in partnership and embrace the change that devolution has brought. The reviewers said that the sports council was at a crossroads. The council needs to take that into account and embrace the future. There are tremendous opportunities in sport. We need to think more broadly, fund more broadly and develop broader, systematic objectives. The sports council will be part of the jigsaw of funding. Funding for free swimming went directly to local authorities and we need to encourage them along the way of sports participation as well.

We need sport and physical and active recreation at the heart of Welsh life and at the forefront of Government policy, making it integral and complementary, making a radical difference to the way we live and see ourselves and, importantly, how the rest of the world sees us.

Rhodri Glyn Thomas: Diolchaf i bawb am ymateb mor gadarnhaol i'r adroddiad hwn. Yr wyl yn falch o weld bod ganddo gefnogaeth eang. Soniodd Alison am yr angen inni edrych ar y cyfleoedd sydd gan fenywod i gymryd rhan mewn ymarfer corff a chwaraeon. Mae hynny'n eithriadol o bwysig. Ann Jones: On the point of women participating in sport, will you join me in condemning the Football Association of Wales, which is yet again stopping young girls from excelling in the sport? We had the same situation with Caroline Hume, from my constituency, whose case we fought and won.

Rhodri Glyn Thomas: I thank everyone for responding so positively to this report. I am pleased to see that it is widely supported. Alison mentioned the need for us to look at opportunities for women to participate in physical exercise and sports. This is exceedingly important. Owen John Thomas remarked on some of the deficiencies in the present system, and I think that there is a real opportunity to fine tune the provision in order offer increased access to people and enable them to participate.

Rhodri Glyn Thomas: It seems that the FAW is not in the twentieth century, let alone the twenty-first. I endorse Ann's remarks. It is important that young women have the opportunity to excel. A number of good women's football teams compete at a high level,

Rhodri Glyn Thomas: Ymddengys nad yw Cymdeithas Bêl-droed Cymru yn yr ugeinfed ganrif, heb sôn am yr unfed ganrif ar hugain. Ategaf sylwadau Ann. Mae'n bwysig bod menywod ifanc yn cael cyfle i ragori. Mae nifer o dimau pêl-droed menywod yn cystadlu ar lefel uchel.

I am somewhat surprised that Owen John Thomas did not mention baseball in his contribution. He referred to baseball in the Committee, and insisted on a reference to it in the report. Rosemary mentioned the role of local authorities and the importance of including the Education and Lifelong Learning Committee and the Health and Social Services Committee in this process. I have written to them and drawn their attention to the report, and I hope that, after 1 May, they will consider the report and see how they can contribute to the process. This report is not set in stone. I hope that it will develop and that there will be further contributions to it.

Rhodri Glyn Thomas: The report emphasises the need to educate young people about the benefits of a healthy lifestyle, and to ensure opportunities in schools, through the national curriculum, for children and young people to participate in physical activities. As the Committee prepared the report, Owen John Thomas again emphasised his experience as a deputy head in a primary school; the facilities often do not exist in such schools to allow children the best opportunities for sports. It is important that we consider that too. I hope that there will be an opportunity to develop this report and include more comments in it. There are health and education benefits to this.

John Griffiths: In respect of developing the

John Griffiths: Gyda golwg ar ddatblygu'r

report, it questions whether national teams' successes feed into mass participation in sport. There seems to be much anecdotal evidence of this aspect. The success of the national side under Mark Hughes is getting the kids out, playing football on the streets and on the playing fields. Is there any further research on that matter?

Rhodri Glyn Thomas: Phil Williams did much research into the effect of the fortune of the national teams on the Welsh economy. If you have a chat with Phil later on, he will be able to explain it all to you. However, it is important in terms of the nation's confidence. We all wholeheartedly support the Welsh team's efforts under Mark Hughes's leadership. Because of the impending election, I refused a ticket to Saturday's game so that I could canvas in Carmarthen East and Dinefwr: but I will certainly be at the next game. We are all confident that the national team will succeed in its endeavours to reach Portugal, and some of us should, perhaps, be in Portugal to support the team when it arrives.

Mae Glyn yn ymgorfforiad o bwysigrwydd ymarfer corff. Yr ydym i gyd yn llawen ei fod wedi gwella mor gyflym ar ôl ei driniaeth, ac mae hynny i'w briodoli, i raddau helaeth, i'r ffaith y bu'n cymryd rhan mewn chwaraeon ar hyd y blynyddoedd. We are all pleased that he has recovered so quickly after his treatment, and that is largely due to the fact that he has participated in sports for so many years. He used to play rugby in mid Wales and the bruises and scars can still be seen on the bodies of those who played against him over those years. However, I believe that Glyn's criticism of the Minister was inappropriate today. Whatever the
