Pwrpas

1. Dyma'r ail yn y gyfres o adroddiadau rheolaidd i'r Pwyllgor ar y cynnydd a wnaed yng ngoleuni pob un o'r 52 pwynt gweithredu a nodir yn *Ffermio i'r Dyfodol: cyfeiriad newydd i ffermio yng Nghymru*. Bu'r Pwyllgor yn ystyried yr adroddiad cyntaf ar 17 Ebrill 2002.

Argymhelliad

2. Gwahoddir y Pwyllgor i nodi'r sefyllfa. Caiff adroddiad arall ei ddarparu i'r Pwyllgor ddechrau'r flwyddyn newydd.

- 3. Cyhoeddwyd Ffermio i'r Dyfodol: cyfeiriad newydd i ffermio yng Nghymru ar 21 Tachwedd 2001. Strategaeth dymor hir Llywodraeth y Cynulliad ydyw ar gyfer creu dyfodol cynaliadwy i amaethyddiaeth yng Nghymru.
- 4. Mae'r strategaeth yn cynnwys 52 pwynt gweithredu y mae Llywodraeth y Cynulliad a'i sefydliadau partner wedi ymrwymo i'w rhoi ar waith.

Y cynnydd hyd yma

- 5. Mae'r tabl yn <u>Atodiad 1</u> yn nodi'r cynnydd a wnaed hyd yma ar bob un o'r 52 pwynt gweithredu. Dyma grynodeb o'r sefyllfa:
 - mae 49 o'r mesurau neu 94% naill ai ar y gweill neu wedi'u cyflawni. Mae gwaith wedi'i gyflawni ar 9 (17%) pwynt gweithredu, sef un yn fwy nag ym mis Ebrill. O ran y 40 (70%) arall, mae gwaith naill ai wedi'i ddechrau, wedi'i gyflawni'n rhannol neu bron â'i gwblhau.
 - 3 (6%) pwynt gweithredu nid yw'r gwaith wedi dechrau eto.

Monitro

- 7. Roedd adroddiad mis Ebrill yn cynnwys peth gwaith rhagbaratöol ar ddata sylfaenol ar y dangosyddion perfformiad y bydd cynnydd yn cael ei fonitro yn eu herbyn. Mae copi ohono yn <u>Atodiad 2</u>. Gofynnodd y Pwyllgor a fyddai modd cynnwys gwell data ar adar tir fferm mewn unrhyw adroddiad ar gynnydd yn y dyfodol. Bu llawer o drafod gyda'r RSPB ond ni lwyddon nhw na ni i nodi unrhyw ddiffygion gwirioneddol yn y wybodaeth sydd ar gael ar hyn o bryd.
- 8. Dylid nodi bod y wybodaeth sydd ar gael ar hyn o bryd yn dangos tueddiadau tymor hwy o 1968-1972 i 1988-1991; ac mae tabl arall yn dangos data o 1994 ymlaen. Tynnir sylw hefyd at y troednodyn i'r tabl cyntaf sy'n esbonio nad oedd canlyniadau Cymru'n adlewyrchu'r sefyllfa wirioneddol yn ddigon cywir am nad oedd digon o ddata ar gael, er bod y cyrff perthnasol wedi gwneud gwaith i lunio dangosyddion tymor hir gwell. I ddechrau, roedd y dangosydd yn seiliedig ar ddata 1994-2000 Cymru yn unig gan nad oedd gan y Cyfrifiad Adar Cyffredin ddigon o safleoedd yng Nghymru. Yn dilyn y trafodaethau cychwynnol a gyflwynwyd drwy Lywodraeth y

Cynulliad, edrychwyd ar ddata gyda'r RSPB ac Ymddiriedolaeth Adareg Prydain er mwyn defnyddio gwybodaeth ychwanegol ar newidiadau yn ardaloedd bridio adar Cymru ac asesiadau ynghylch newidiadau tymor hir i ardaloedd bridio. Mae hyn, bellach, wedi'i gynnwys yn y mynegai sydd wedi'i gyhoeddi ac mae'n rhoi darlun mwy gwrthrychol o'r newidiadau yn y boblogaeth adar yng Nghymru dros y 30 mlynedd diwethaf. Yn unol â hynny, nid yw'n sicr y gallwn ddatblygu'r mater hwn ymhellach ond, wrth gwrs, byddwn yn parhau i drafod yn rheolaidd gyda'r RSPB ac adrodd ar unrhyw ddatblygiadau newydd mewn adroddiadau ar gynnydd yn y dyfodol.

- 9. Mae gwaith yn mynd rhagddo o ran mireinio'r meini prawf dethol ar gyfer rhywogaethau tir fferm a nodi'r data sylfaenol perthnasol sydd ar gael. Cynhaliwyd trafodaethau gyda phartneriaid allweddol ac mae asesiadau sydd gennym yn nodi y gallai fod angen tipyn mwy o waith ar gasglu data. Rhown fwy o fanylion pan fydd penderfyniadau wedi'u gwneud ar y ffordd orau ymlaen.
- 10. Yn olaf, bydd y Grwp Ymgynghorol ar Ddyfodol Ffermio yn cyfarfod ar 12 Rhagfyr er mwyn cymryd stoc a rhoi cyngor ar y camau pellach y gallai fod eu hangen er mwyn sefydlu'r cyfeiriad newydd i amaethyddiaeth.

Note: The data presented here are outside the scope of National Statistics. They are an alternative to the wild bird indicator showing data from 1970 that was originally planned. Recently work was commissioned by the Department of Environment, Food and Rural Affairs (DEFRA) from the British Trust for Ornithology (BTO) and the Royal Society for the Protection of Birds (RSPB) to produce long-term wild bird indicators for the regions of the UK. This work used the results of the Common Birds Census (CBC) and various other data sources. Unfortunately it was concluded that the results for Wales were not sufficiently representative due to lack of available data. The CBC ended in 2000 so in future regional indicators are expected to incorporate data from the Breeding Bird Survey (BBS) which started in 1994 and covers a large number of representative sites. This should provide sufficient coverage for indicators for Wales to be produced in the future.

The above chart contains data from the Breeding Bird Survey 2000 and shows the number of widespread breeding bird species that are estimated to have increased or decreased in abundance in Wales between 1994 and 2000. The species are grouped into the major habitat groups-farmed, woodland and urban. Other habitats (coastal, wetland and not classified) are also shown as a separate group.

Note that in 2000, over 200 plots were surveyed in Wales in the BBS-the results shown only relate to 53 species that were detected in at least 30 plots. Therefore these data cannot be described as representative of all birds in Wales as less abundant (including many farmland species) or rare species are not included.


Also, at the start of the BBS in 1994, populations of many farmland and woodland bird species had already shown steep declines over the previous 25 years. Hence current trends need to be interpreted carefully.

In Wales, 19 species (36 per cent) increased and 4 species (8 per cent) decreased in abundance between 1994 and 2000.

'A Plan for Wales' contains the following target for 2010: 'The populations of wild birds that are now in decline must have stabilised or started to rise'.

In Wales, 18 per cent of species increased and 43 per cent decreased in range between 1968-1972 and 1988-1991.

Of the major habitats, over half the birds of farmed habitats decreased in range over the 20-year period.

In the UK, 45 per cent of species increased and 18 per cent of species decreased in abundance between 1994 and 2000. However these percentages are not directly comparable with those for Wales as more species (100) were included in the UK results due to a larger number of plots being surveyed.

In the UK, the long-term 'Quality of Life' indicator identifies similar long-term declines in the range of

farmland birds to those suggested by the above chart.

Discussions are still ongoing with partner organisations on the way forward in selecting suitable indicators. Consequently it has not been possible to provide any meaningful hard data at this time. It is hoped to submit more substantive proposals in the next update report in July. In the meantime, our preliminary proposals for monitoring include the following farmland species:

Marsh Fritillary Butterfly

Indicator of extensive management of wet and semi-improved pastures using heavy livestock such as cattle.

Lesser Horseshoe Bats

Indicator of landscape structure/habitat condition such as semi-improved and unimproved pasture, thick hedges, woodland, etc.

Otters or Salmonids

Indicator of general health of freshwater aquatic systems.

Higher Plants

Indicator of agricultural improvement/ increasing fertility.
