### 1 A Message from John Dunford

1.1

To



The Government has asked me to carry out an independent review of the office, role and functions of the Children's Commissioner for England. I am seeking a wide cross-section of views and evidence to inform the review and very much hope that you will contribute.

- 1.2 The role of Children's Commissioner for England was created by the Children Act 2004 with a remit to promote awareness of the views and interests of children in England.
- 1.3 The Secretary of State's letter to me today, 12 July 2010, asks me to consider three aspects of the Children's Commissioner's activities in particular:

- 1. The powers, remit and functions of the Children's Commissioner.
- 2. The relationship with other related functions supported by Government.
- 3. Value for Money.
- 1.4 The full text of that letter is available <a href="here">here</a> and includes some more specific issues that I have been asked to cover in the review. I am approaching all of them with an open mind.
- 1.5 The Secretary of State has asked me to take account of the views of a wide range of partners on how government can best protect children's interests including the voluntary and private sector, commissioners and providers of children's services, the current and previous Children's Commissioners and from children and young people themselves. I shall therefore be seeking views and evidence from a variety of sources and in various ways.
- 1.6 Through this letter I am inviting you to let me have your views by completing the response form <a href="here">here</a>. This includes some specific questions and allows you to add other points that you feel are important to the review. I should particularly like to receive examples of your own experience of the Children's Commissioner, including an explanation of any action that was taken, what impact it had and any suggestions you have for how things might have been handled differently or better.
- 1.7 The views of children and young people will be particularly important to the review and I therefore hope to meet with some of them, for example through the Department for Education Children and Youth Board. I shall also be asking organisations that work with children and young people if we can use their networks or if they can suggest other ways of obtaining feedback from children and young people so that we get a good crosssection of views.
- 1.8 Your evidence will help me enormously in thinking about these issues and reaching informed conclusions.
- 1.9 I am due to give the Secretary of State an update in mid-October and my final report to him is due to be completed by the end of November 2010. I should therefore welcome your response as soon as possible, but no later than 4 October 2010.
- 1.10 Please feel free to draw this call for evidence to the attention of others you think may wish to submit evidence to the review.
