Title: The Health Bill and the impact of the Appointments Commission on

Wales

Purpose

1. At it's meeting on 19th January, the Committee requested a list of bodies that are affected by the Bill and clarification on whether the Bill would give new powers to the Secretary of State.

Summary / Recommendations

2. The Committee is invited to note the paper.

Background

- 3. In practice, since 2002, informal arrangements have been in place between the Assembly and the NHS Appointments Commission for the Commission to undertake a number of appointment functions on the Assembly's behalf. These have covered bodies both where the Assembly has a mere power of appointment and bodies where there is also a power to issue directions to the Commission.
- 4. The Assembly has the power to issue directions to the Commission in relation to the Health Protection Agency or the Healthcare Commission (Commission for Healthcare Audit and Inspection) but has not exercised this power. The Assembly has instead entered into arrangements pursuant to section 41 of the Government of Wales Act 1998 (GOWA) which empowers the Assembly to make arrangements for appointment functions to be exercised by a "relevant authority", which in this case is the Appointments Commission. The Assembly uses section 41 of GOWA widely and has interpreted "relevant authority" liberally so as to include English NDPBs even if their statutory functions do not specifically provide for such arrangements.
- 5. Informal discussions between policy officials have provided comfort that the Assembly can continue to negotiate fresh section 41 arrangements with the new Appointments Commission, which will provide greater flexibility in the appointments process than issuing directions to the Commission.
- 6. A complete list of the bodies affected by these arrangements is at Annex 1.

Powers of the Secretary of State

- 7. The Bill does not confer new powers on the Secretary of State but provides for the SOS to direct the new Appointments Commission to undertake appointments functions. Part 5 of the Bill covers provisions to replace the NHS Appointments Commission with a new organisation called the Appointments Commission. This is in line with the Government's response to the Public Administration Select Committee (June 2003), which indicated that some Departments could benefit from using the services of the NHS Appointments Commission to support their sponsor teams in making appointments but that statutory authority would be needed to achieve this.
- 8. The Bill will establish the Appointments Commission as a Non-Departmental Public Body and give it powers to exercise, if directed to do so by the Secretary of State, the appointment functions of the Secretary of State for Health and the Privy Council in relation to the appointment of Chairs and non executive members to health and social care bodies and health professional regulatory bodies (Annex 1). The appointment process of Welsh representatives on the health professional regulatory bodies will also be delegated to the Appointments Commission. The Appointments Commission may also assist, if requested to do so, the Boards of NHS Foundation Trusts with their similar powers of appointment and also assist, if requested to do so English ministers with their similar powers of appointment to other public bodies.
