There is much that I would like to say — much as the ambition behind the legislation is worthy, practically, in the climate that we are experiencing financially, it is a non starter. The money that this would cost could be better spent by headteachers / local authorities on improving the experience that pupils have when in the schools they are in daily, i.e the school estate and indeed on the outdoor environments which surround schools; provision within the classrooms and adults with which to deliver it.

Not only this, even if money were no object, logistically, schools cannot be responsible for another thing. Logistics around:

Finding staff to volunteer to take the significant responsibility of acting in loco parentis after school hours

The additional funding of supply teachers to cover teachers / TAs who are willing

The cost to the education of others left behind whose teachers are on the residential

The increased burden upon headteachers / senior leaders.

Is there enough resource and capacity in the system in order to enable all schools to take part?

In my view, compelling local authorities to make this provision adds an increased burden to a system which is already struggling to make adequate provision due to cost pressures, projects driven by political horse trading. The proposal as a universal provision, whilst laudable in its aims, is unsustainable and unrealistic.
