I have many questions and comments around this proposal

- 1. 2) The intention is that the statutory obligation to ensure residential outdoor education is provided would fall on those who are responsible for arranging the provision, i.e. local authorities for maintained schools. This is incorrect, schools arrange the provision.
- 2. Schools already have other means to support families in need e.g. PDG Where is the evidence to suggest Primary Schools refuse pupils who can not afford it? Our charging policies state that payments for trips are voluntary and no child is excluded. Many schools will offer payment plans or pay for some children out of their own budget.
- 3. Where is the funding coming from for this? Will it be diverted from other areas of the school budgets?
- 4. Point 8 The age that children can cope with this length of stay varies considerably, how will this be monitored to ensure opportunities arrive when the child is ready?
- 5. Point 9 How will it be monitored to ensure all learners have the opportunity and others don't have it twice as they change schools?

In addition - What consideration has been given to the wellbeing of the staff who already give up their own time and time with their families? Will schools be funded for the agency staff costs when staff i.e. Year 6 residential with 30children requires at least 3 members of staff - the class teacher and will have to leave their posts in school, that could cost a school over £2000 in agency staff to backfill these posts. Will the cost of the buses be included?
