The potential negative impact is if the experience is left too late in a pupils education and therefore other barriers get in the way preventing pupils from taking the risk to attend the residential.

I have been lead teacher for 4 nights, staying at venue, 1 group first half of week, 2nd group after. It is exhausting for a fit adult, for pupils it might have negative returns with being too tired to enjoy it and therefore make the experience poor. They might not be physically able to achieve and enjoy the activities due to tired as pupils are not as fit as they once were. For older pupils in high schools I feel it is more appropriate and challenging.
