We currently take both our Year 5 and Year 6 learners on residential trips.

We currently take our Year 5 and Year 6 learners on two night residential trips. On the third day they are ready to go home.

Is there anything else you would like to say about this proposal?

I think taking children away on residential trips is one of the most valuable experiences that our learners get whilst they are at our school. I do worry about staff though.

Staff do not get paid extra, for the additional responsibility of looking after learners overnight or for the additional hours that they work.

Learners have increasingly complex needs. We returned from a residential trip to Glan Llyn last week, we took a type one diabetic learner with us, staff were testing his bloods every two hours, morning noon and night. The pressure of constantly stabilising blood levels and the constant reassurance that we had to give parents was extremely challenging. There were other learners requiring medication and 5 other children needing constant reassurance and support because of their anxieties.

Staff are becoming more and more reluctant to offer to go on residential visits. I strongly suggest that if the Bill is successful and staff have to take learners on residential visits, then staff who go need to be paid an extra sum of money, this too should be part of the Bill.
