Equality Considerations: Could the proposed Bill have any positive impacts on some children and young people in particular? If so, who and why?

Barriers to taking children and young people on residential outdoor visits may include poverty, Additional Learning Needs and staff anxiety. The Outdoor Education Bill would ensure opportunities for all children to experience outdoor education, regardless of their situation. With regard to poverty, a fully funded visit would mean all children would have the chance to experience taking part in opportunities and not just those that are from more privileged backgrounds. Taking learners with additional learning needs, including behavioural challenges can be a barrier to taking them on outdoor educational visits. These challenges can increase staff anxiety and lead to opportunities not being given. This bill would ensure that opportunities for outdoor education would have to be provided. These opportunities would lead to all children and young people receiving the benefits of outdoor education

Equality Considerations: Could the proposed Bill have any negative impacts on some children and young people in particular. If so, who and why? What could this Bill do to mitigate any negative impacts?

Consideration would need to be given to children and young people with anxiety. This could be due to physical or social difficulties or additional needs. Any residential outdoor experience would need to be planned well and provide for these learners, ensuring opportunities that suit these learners including differentiated activities and adapting the provision.

What age do you believe is most suitable for children and young people to be offered an opportunity to undertake a residential outdoor education experience?

Year 6 (age 10-11)

It is possible for younger children to gain valuable benefits from outdoor education, however it may be more effective if just for a night or two if in Year 3 or 4.

Is four nights/five days the best length for a residential outdoor experience?

The number of nights should be dependent of age. Schools report that two or three nights is perfect for primary aged school children while up to five is suitable for older learners.
