10. Is there anything else you would like to say about this proposal?

I wonder if the hidden costs have been factored in to this proposal. In the event that all our KS3 pupils were to be offered a guaranteed five day trip, we would have to find:

- The costs levied by the provider for the activity;
- Transport costs (roughly £500 per coach to go to Glanllyn, for example) multiplied by 14 coaches if the whole of KS3 were to go. This obviously excludes Y10 and 11: total cost £7,000;
- Approximately £11,200 in supply costs to cover the supervising staff;
- 56 days of lost teaching which may not be shared around a large number of staff and could fall disproportionately on some subjects;
- Hidden costs of the extra administration work;
- If this were increased to include all KS4 pupils, the number of lost teaching days would increase to 92, and the total cost, not including the provider costs, will rise to £27,300. If the intention is not to restrict to statutory school age and the sixth form were included, the cost would be nearer £34,000.

While these figures would be spread over five (or 7) years and would, therefore, represent a cost of £5,000 - £6,000 per annum, without the provider costs, and this represents a significant additional time and financial cost. Clearly, if the trips were run in Y5 and Y6, none of the above, from a secondary perspective, would apply.

My other concern is whether this would genuinely be new money. We are facing a cut of some £82,000 next year, even with stable pupil numbers. We simply cannot afford to have existing funding repurposed or ring-fenced. The Welsh Government has also set its face against too many grants or funding coming with strings attached and I would be opposed to seeing this position weakened with funding fo9r outdoor education ring-fenced in the allocation.
