## ESJ Committee Question – Wales Without Violence Framework

The four-step model outlining a public health approach to violence prevention in the Wales Without Violence (WWV) Framework was first developed by the World Health Organization in 2002<sup>1</sup>. Through the development of the WWV Framework we sought to update this model to ensure that it was relevant to the experience of those in Wales delivering a public health approach to violence prevention.

The WWV Framework was developed through extensive and participatory consultation with over 1,000 professionals, children, young people and members of communities in Wales. More than 480 children and young people and over 550 professionals and volunteers participated in the consultation. It draws on their ideas and experiences and articulates a shared understanding and collaborative approach to violence prevention.

The range of voices involved in shaping this Framework demonstrates that preventing violence among children and young people must be a collaborative effort – no single sector or organisation can solve this problem alone

## Numbers of CYP involved with the WWV Framework

The Wales Violence Prevention Unit and Peer Action Collective Cymru engaged with over 480 children and young people from across Wales:

- 243 [freshers survey responses]
- 96 [pop up shop]
